These exercises will be so planned that they will set a high standard for future senior classes of the Malta High School. We expect to have three graduates.

School play May 14. Remember the date. Up to Saturday night Secretary of State A. M. Alderson had registered 7,900 automobiles, that number of name plates having been sent out by parcel post from the capital station. There have also been registered 300 motor cycles. It is estimated that a majority of the machines in the state will be registered by the middle of June.

A proclamation was issued by Governor Stewart Saturday announcing that on and after May 15, the quarantine that has been in effect on account of the hoof and mouth disease will be lifted and permit the shipment of cattle into New Mexico, California, Nevada, Utah, the Republic of Mexico, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, Wyoming and the Dominion of Canada.

All records for the recording of brands in Montana were broken this month when a total of 681 were recorded with D. W. Raymond, secretary of the state board of stock commissioners. The previous record was 650 brands in April a year ago. The two letter brands are almost all exhausted and shortly the office will be forced to issue three letter combinations. The constant filing of brands is taken as an indication that the stream of settlers to Montana remains undiminished.

Taking the view that the new state law has greatly reduced their earnings through the reduction of hours in which they can keep open for business the saloon keepers of Great Falls, acting through the Retail Liquor Dealers' association, has petitioned the city council for a reduction in their license fees. The saloon keepers contend that the period in which they may do business is reduced about 40 per cent, and they ask that the annual city license of \$400 be reduced to \$200. The matter has been referred to the judiciary committee.

Professional automobile races, which will bring to Helena some of the most expert and famous auto racing men in the world, will be one of the features of the Montana state fair next fall. Announcement to this effect was made by the board of directors. The contest will be under the auspices of the International Motor Contest association and will be of three days' duration. Purses aggregating \$5,000 will be hung up for the events, and before the final agreements were made it was ascertained that this amount would bring to Helena such men as Barney Oldfield, Jisbrow, Durman, Ratney, Cleary, Nonkmeier and others.

Deferred action on petition No. 604 until other petition pending in same territory is received, or until it is evident that the two do not conflict.

Action of Blaine County Board on road petition No. 48 approved by Phillips County Board and same ordered surveyed and opened.

Viewers report accepted on Peterson road, ordered surveyed and opened.

Road petition (Valley county No. 42) deferred until investigated by the board.

Road petition No. 23, Blaine county viewer's report accepted; ordered surveyed and opened.

Road petition No. 610, action deferred until investigated by the board.

Road petition No. 608, action deferred until investigated by the board.

Road petition No. 611, action deferred until investigated by the board.

Sampson road, Blaine county viewers report accepted and road ordered surveyed and opened.

Viewer's report No. 190, road petition No. 5, Blaine county, action deferred pending investigation by the Commissioners.

Blaine county road petition No. 50, action deferred until report of viewers. Deeds procured.

After considerable discussion and in view of the fact that the Board of Commissioners are responsible for the maintenance and supervision of all roads within their respective counties, it is hereby resolved that unless otherwise ordered no road shall be changed or new road created without the inspection and approval of one or more of the Commissioners wherein there is a likelihood of an increased cost to the county or where a greater number of miles will be created. Said inspection may be made either before or after the petition has been filed.

Board adjourned to meet in special session April 16th, 1915, to take up letting of contract for jail cages and such other business as may come before the board.

DROWNED IN THE MISSOURI.

Laura, the three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur J. Hall, was drowned in the Missouri river at Fifth Point, Tuesday of last week.

The child had been playing near the bank of the river close to the house when she either fell into the water or was blown in by the high wind which prevailed at the time. Marks in the mud along the bank were plainly visible where the child had slid into the water, but although diligent search was kept up all day Tuesday the body was not found until the next morning when was discovered lying on a sand bar. The remains were taken to Glasgow where the funeral was held Thursday.

WEATHER FOR APRIL.

Havre, Mont., May 1st, 1915. The Monthly Meteorological Summary with comparative data for the month of April, 1915, issued from the local office, U. S. Weather Bureau, shows that the month was unusually dry and warm, and that winter weather was abruptly turned into spring weather conditions on April 1st, and the month was the warmest in its average daily mean temperature in the past 35 years of record. The season as a whole was two weeks earlier than ordinary.

The mean temperature for the month was 50 degrees making an average daily excess of temperature of 10.8 degrees as compared with the normal. The highest temperature was 82 on the 29th and the lowest 28 on the 1st. The highest temperature for this month during the past 35 years was 94 degrees on April 28, 1910, and the lowest for the same period was 11 below zero on April 1st, 1899.

The total precipitation for the month was 0.24 inches, which is one-fourth of the normal amount for the month. There was practically no rain fall after the 4th day of the month, on which date 0.22 inches of rain fell.

The prevailing direction of wind was from the east. The highest velocity was 8 miles an hour from the southwest on April 30th.

There were 16 clear days, 12 partly cloudy and 2 cloudy days. The percentage of possible sunshine was on the 4th and 20th.
