Havre has one of the three big summer schools now in session in northern Montana. The others are held at Plentywood, for Valley and Sheridan counties, and the other at Kallispell for Flathead county.

Havre's summer and teachers' training school bids fair to be the biggest and best of the trio, not only as to the number of live and enthusiastic student teachers enrolled to profit thereby.

Prof. E. Lincoln Smith of the Aberdeen Normal School, art department, has an exceptionally fine art exhibit on display in the High School assembly room, which the general public is cordially invited to enjoy at any hour of the day during this week.

After the open air concert given Friday evening by the Havre band, the summer school people are planning on a social evening of games and music to be held in the assembly hall.

Mr. Lawrence Smith, son of Prof. E. Lincoln Smith, our popular and enthusiastic art lecturer, is representing the School Century Primary Education and Popular Education publishers this week at the training school.

Miss Merle Welsh, of Fergus county, came to Havre's training school because of the exceptionally fine opportunity to study primary methods, folk dancing, games, story telling, and to learn card board instruction, all of which makes for an efficient primary teacher.

**THE 1915 WOOL CLIP.**

Monday evening when James Le-Noir loaded his last sack of wool into a Great Northern freight car at Strater siding the season's clip for this section of the Milk River valley was closed, as the same day every pound left the Malta warehouse, owned and managed by John A. Ebaugh, had been loaded into cars thus cleaning up all the wool. Walker, the veteran buyer, who has bought wool in this section for nearly 25 years, was the last of the bunch to leave Malta for the east and Mr. Walker is also usually the first to arrive in the spring.

Mr. Ebaugh says, that while the amount of wool handled this season was as not as large as last year, still a goodly amount of wool passed through his hands at the warehouse.

Two thousand four hundred and one bags of wool were received at the house and 844,687 pounds of wool were loaded into 28 freight cars from the same warehouse. In the early part of the season several clips were purchased at good figures but along the last few days there was no market for the product and the wool growers around Malta got tired of waiting for promised sales and all decided to consign their wool to the large warehouses at Boston, the Chicago house being filled early in the season.

**WAGNER SHOOTING AFFAIR.**

E. M. Parmenter and Thos. Byers were arrested a Wagner early Sunday morning by Sheriff Shaw for the alleged shooting up of the Phillips Douchette claim shack. The shooting trouble grows, it is said, out of Byers' attempt to locate on Douchette's claim. The latter alleges that while he was away from his farm one day Byers squatted on the place and when he returned both Byers and Parmenter shot at him using rifles. Byers is alleged to have appropriated 80 acres belonging to Homesteader J. A. Goss and has plowed up a considerable portion of the latter's flax. There is a strong sentiment at Wagner disfavorable to the claim jumpers and it is averred that each man has had considerable trouble in other places for the same reason. Parmenter came to this district from North Dakota several years ago and during the winter months conducts a peddling business in the country.

The case was heard at Malta Tuesday in Judge Wilson's court before a jury composed of Wm. Goggins, Tom Simonton, Ellis Blumenthal, George Partridge, James Moore and Geo. Chambers, and the jury fined Parmenter \$100 and costs. F. C. Gabriel appeared for the county attorney's office, and Attorney for the defense.
