

Dennis McGrath, the discharged county attorney of Phillips county, came in the first of the week from an absence of several weeks and still thinks he is on the job, at least he made the assertion to one of the county officials that he was going to get back in the office of county attorney and show the commissioners and the rest of the people of Phillips county that he was it. McGrath has about as much chance of getting back in the office of county attorney as he has of becoming president of the United States. The costly experience the people of Phillips county received from his administration has thoroughly cured them of any McGrathism they might have had. The surprising thing is that he has the nerve to come back and face the voters and commissioners of this county after his actions of the past two months and the way he conducted the business of the office while here. The nerve of some people is exceeded only by their gall and it appears McGrath has an abundance of both.

SCHOOL NOTES.

Mr. J. L. Elliott, principal of the Malta city schools, was appointed a member of the County Board of Examiners by the County Commissioners this week.

The Malta, Dodson and Saco schools are sending very fine general exhibits to the State Fair. The boy or girl winning first prize in the corn and canning contests will be given a free trip to the State Fair.

The patrons of the DeFlyer and the Schempp schools have abandoned the plan of bridging Milk River opposite the school houses named. The Schempp school will be moved to within two and one-half miles of the Smith ranch and transportation to this school will be provided for the pupils of the Uglad school, thus consolidating the two. The DeFlyer school will be moved to the Big Bend and enlarged to accommodate the additional number pupils that will be enabled to attend by so placing the school.

Two new schools were established last week, one in the Cowan district near the Duffy ranch and one in the Zortman district in the vicinity of Phillips.


The County Board of Examiners will meet Saturday the 11th, to issue teachers' certificates.

A hearing of petition for changing boundary lines of Dist. No. 17, Strater, and Dist. No. 8, Cowan, will be given Saturday, 18th, in the office of the County Superintendent.

H. L. Wolfe was appointed to the office of county attorney yesterday and assumed the duties of the office. There was some little misunderstanding about the appointment in reference to the hiring of Attorney O'Keefe to assist in the prosecuting of the cases from the Larb Hills. Mr. Wolfe would not accept the position and hire O'Keefe. The commissioners are given the power to hire additional counsel when deemed necessary and they took the responsibility of hiring the additional counsel.
