L. M. TRAFFON EXPLAINS HIS POSITION ON COURT HOUSE

Editor Malta Enterprise:

As it seems we are unfortunately to have a court house location war thrust upon our little town, a few words from me as to the facts in the case may not come amiss at this time.

To begin with, I deplore this agitation, and I think the men who started it were ill advised, and have not the good of their town at heart to attempt to line up this entire community in a factional fight and stir up all the ill will and bitterness that goes with such a fight. It is not the best way to build up our little town, and certainly will do more harm and injury than all the Commercial clubs in christendom can ever make right. When the court house location was talked of, I had sixteen lots in Block seven, that were offered the commissioners by me for \$5500. Other parties owned the remaining four lots in this block, and these were offered at \$4000, making the total cost of the block to the taxpayers of Phillips county \$3500.

At the time we were getting signatures for the petition to form our new county, the promise was made by some interested parties, among them Mr. E. D. Phillips, that if county division went through and Malta was the county seat, that a suitable block for a court house would be furnished by the citizens of Malta and free of cost to the taxpayers. So when the \$3500 site was offered the commissioners they began to hear about the free site promise, for the sixteen lots in block seven. I had made a deed conveying them to Phillips county, and the deed was held for some three months awaiting their action. They did not wish to spend the county money for this purpose, and took no action. Then as no one else offered to do anything, I offered them the whole of block nine for a court house without one cent of cost, and this offer they accepted and there was no objection to their action at the time at least. I never heard of any.

Now as to the location of block nine. It is just two blocks west of block seven, altogether three and one-half blocks from the postoffice, and four blocks from the First State Bank and Great Northern hotel. It is as central as the court house at Glasgow or Chinook and more central than the court house at Havre. It is fine, level land, and can be made into beautiful grounds. It is generous in size, being a full block containing 22 lots, and not a six-lot proposition.

The kind of a court house I have in mind for Phillips county to build would look pretty slick on six lots. Let the backers of block seven for a court house, offer what I offer free of cost, that is the entire of block seven as I offered the entire of block nine. Then I will use all my efforts to have the court house erected on block seven, though to my notion it is not as suitable a location as block nine.

Application has been made to the city engineer for water and sewerage to connect block nine with the city system, so block nine, you might say, is right in the heart of the city.

Insane Man Attempts Suicide

Prisoner In County Jail Wounds Himself Dies Later In Butte Hospital

The Phillips county sheriff's office was notified Friday night that a man named John H. Carney, was causing a disturbance at Woodridge, and needed attention. Sheriff Shaw arrested the man and brought him to Malta where he was pronounced insane by Drs. Clay and Blankenhorn, and committed to the State Asylum at Warm Springs by County Commissioner Chas. A. Rosa, who was acting in the absence of the district judge.

While confined in the jail here awaiting his removal to the asylum, Carney attempted to take his life by cutting his throat with a table

knife while at breakfast Saturday morning. The wound was an ugly looking gash, but the knife just missed the jugular vein, and was not considered serious.

Sheriff Shaw and Deputy Vaupell left with Carney Saturday night. Searling Butte Carney became very ill and at that city he was taken to a hospital where he died an hour later from the results of his insane condition, the wound having nothing to do with his illness.

Carney has been working at Woodridge as a painter, and was one of a large number of the floating population drawn to this county by the great call for labor.
