THE SMASH UP.

Particulars of the wreck which happened here on the 10th inst., as taken from the Sioux City Press.

About 12 P. M. the regular western passenger train on the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul, consisting of four passenger cars, sleeper, baggage and mail car, drawn by engine No. 42, Tom Manchester at the throttle, ran into a break in the track about forty rods east of the depot. The washout was caused by a heavy rain which fell in rapid torrents from 6 to 10 P. M. The railroad embankment formed a dam and the water rose to about five feet, the only outlet for which was a small culvert, over which the water rose, causing the dirt to wash through, soon leaving a clear sweep for the water over as well as through the culvert, leaving the ties supported only by the rails to which they were spiked. The engine passed through unharmed more than a thorough shaking up. The tender did not fare so well, however, being pretty badly demoralized and parting company with the engine. A MURDER AT MITCHELL.

Michael Burns Killed in a Drunken Yankton Press.

Yankton Press.—Last Sunday evening the tracklayers who had been engaged on the line between Emmetsburg and Estherville in Iowa, arrived here to go to work on the Jim valley road. They came pretty well steamed up with whisky and were quarrelling all the way up. Monday morning a little more and resumed the quarrel, soon coming to blows. They were separated by Justice Abbey and upon promise of going out on the line to work, were permitted to depart. But they went no further than to the boarding car, which was side tracked near the round house, where they rummaged the row which ended in the death of Michael Burns. John Lacy and James Ward, both belonging to the tracklaying force were arrested and taken to jail. Tuesday Lacy was arraigned before Justice Hitchcock, A. J. Waterhouse appearing for the prosecution and Dillon & Preston for the defense. Resting the case when the prosecution ended. Wednesday, Ward was placed on trial, but the hearing was postponed until to-day.

An inquest was held before Coroner Curtis, Monday evening, and a verdict rendered that the deceased came to his death by blows received from persons unknown. Drs. Crane and Harris held a postmortem examination and decided that his death occurred from concussion of the brain.

The fatal fight was not witnessed by any of our citizens, as has been stated. It was a row among men from another state, who came here to work on the railroad. Burns was killed by some member of the party and that is all there is of it.
