Henry Villard, after sending in his resignation as president of the Northern Pacific railway company, made an assignment for the benefit of his creditors.

JUDGES FOR DAKOTA.

An Act to Provide for the Election of District Judges in the Territory of Dakota, and in Appointment and the Powers of the Judiciary Therein.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled.

That on the first Tuesday of April, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-four, and at the general election, every fourth year thereafter, shall be elected by the people of the territory of Dakota, one district judge, who shall hold his office for the term of four years, from and after the first day of June, 1884, and until the first day of January next, succeeding the general election at which his successor shall be elected, and until his successor is qualified.

Sec. 2. That the election provided for in the first section of this act shall be held in the several organized counties composing the several judicial districts, of the territory of Dakota, in the manner general elections are held in said territory, and the result of said election shall be ascertained as provided in chapter twenty-seven of the political code of Dakota territory.

Sec. 3. That from and after the first day of June, 1884, the district courts of the several counties, and territorial judicial subdivisions of Dakota territory, shall be held concurrently by the justices of the Supreme court of said territory assigned to each of the judicial districts thereof, respectively, and the district judges provided for by this act, and such district judges, shall have all the powers conferred upon district judges by the laws of the United States, and of the territory of Dakota, except in cases where the first day of June, 1884, the district courts in the first, second and third judicial districts of said territory, having such civil and criminal jurisdiction, under the constitution of the United States, and the several acts of congress in relation thereto, as is vested in the circuit and district courts of the United States, in which cases where in the United States may be a party, and in which a United States grand jury may be summoned, shall be held by the chief justice and associate justices of the Supreme court of said territory assigned to said districts respectively, and the district judges in each of the several counties, and territorial subdivisions of said territory, or a majority thereof shall when assembled at any term of the Supreme court therein held after the passage of this act, fix the time and place of holding at least two terms of said district court in each of said districts in each year, and shall also fix the times of holding the district courts of said territory in the several counties, and judicial subdivisions of the four judicial districts of said territory.

Sec. 4. That the district courts of said territory, shall be held, and any of the courts so fixed may be held by any justice of the Supreme court, or by any of the district judges provided for by this act, and the justice of the Supreme court, and district judge of each of said judicial districts shall have power to create new judicial subdivisions of the district court, and fix the times of holding the district courts therein until such time as the Judges of the Supreme court shall fix the same, and may change the boundaries of judicial subdivisions as occasion may require.

Said district judges shall also have power to appoint and hold as many special terms of the district court as the business of the district court may demand. Provided however that any of the terms of the district court, or any of the district judges provided for by this act, and the justice of the Supreme court, and district judge of each of said judicial districts shall have power to create new judicial subdivisions of the district court, and fix the times of holding the district courts therein until such time as the Judges of the Supreme court shall fix the same, and may change the boundaries of judicial subdivisions as occasion may require.

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Sec. 5. That all acts and parts of acts of the congress of the United States or of the Legislative Assembly of the territory of Dakota, inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

DAKOTA ITEMS.

W. S. Bowen has received his appointment as postmaster at Yankton, and he expects to be in possession of his office in the course of ten days.

DAKOTA AFFAIRS.

How Dakota Matters are Flourishing at Washington—No Judge Yet.

Delegate Raymond came home from Washington to spend the holidays, and during his stay in the north Dakota he was the subject of many interviews. He has no expectation of division or admission. He reports to the Inter Ocean as follows:

As you know a bill has been introduced for the division of the territory, the line of partition being the 46th parallel. As regards the admission of the southern territory, the northern half preferring to remain a territory, I must say that I shall introduce a bill for this purpose as soon as the committee of the constitutional convention has prepared the bill.

Our people are anxious to secure the ratification of the treaty with the Sioux. I think the congressional commission will report in such a way that the treaty, with some modifications, may be ratified. I shall introduce a bill to double the size of the legislature of the territory. We now have a population of 350,000. The present legislature contains in the lower house, twenty-four members and in the upper, twelve. This thus enables seven men in the upper house to block legislation.

The bill already introduced to appoint two more judges for the territory will probably pass. One of these will be placed in south Dakota and one in north Dakota. The attorneys throughout the territory are interested greatly in the matter, and they will doubtless work hard to obtain its passage.

Mr. Raymond also introduced a bill to provide for the election of district judges in the territory, the associate justice, and the district judges under this act, to act concurrently. The district judges shall each receive an annual salary of \$2,500, to be paid quarterly out of the treasury of the territory. The district judges would have nothing to do wherein the United States is a party.

The fourth judicial district is still without a judge, and the coming Lincoln county term of court bids fair to go over. The president seems to have entirely overlooked the existence of such an extent of country as the fourth district, containing about 100,000 people, and legal business at a stand still. President Arthur seems to exercise his own sweet will, and consumes as much time as Ordway, even in the discharge of his official duties.

Happiness in Marriage.

To live happily together in marriage is usually held to be the ungratified and unfulfilled duty of all married people. Society does not as yet entertain the idea that people who have been married can be so happy together as if they were never married.

And yet the capacity of people to live happily together in marriage is often means coextensive with the capacity or inclination to get married, as this indiscriminate and ungratified duty to marry in marriage implies many things besides that unbelieved quality which is often supposed to be the cause of the continuance of the parties in essentially the same condition of financial prosperity or stringency, as the case may be, after marriage.

Spitter Little Wonders.

In a lecture at the Lowell Institute, Professor Wood dealt with the phenomena of spitter life. The female is larger and much fiercer than the male, who while paying his address in a constant peril, frequently losing some of his legs. In one tribe the female is 1,300 times as large as the male. The spitter's throat is made up of innumerable small threads or fibers, one of these threads being estimated to be one two millionths of an inch in thickness. Three kinds of threads are spun: One of great strength for the radiating or spoke lines of the web. The cross lines, which are finer and are tenacious, that is, they have upon them little specks or globules of a very sticky gum. These specks are very sticky and are tenacious. They are set quite thickly along the line, and are what, in the first instance, catch and hold the wings of the fly. Once caught in this fashion the prey is held secure by threads hung over it somewhat in the manner of a spider's web.

It is that which the spitter throws out in a mass or flood, by which it suddenly envelops the insect, and holds it somewhat afraid, as, for example, a wasp. A scientific experimenter once drew out from the body of a single spider 3,450 yards of thread spider silk—a length a little short of three miles. Silk may be woven of spider's thread, and it is more glossy and brilliant than that of the silk worm, being of a golden color. An enthusiastic entomologist secured enough of it for the weaving of a suit of clothes for Louis XIV.
