Rumored Fight at Woodbury. We heard it reported, yesterday, on apparently good authority, that Col. MUNDAY's regiment had quite a severe skirmish with Foranst's guerrillas on last Saturday, in which the latter were completely routed. We hope that it is correct, and that the engagement will prove to be something of importance.

Since writing the above, we hear it confirmed by undoubted authority .-FOREEST lost thirteen men killed and a number wounded. Federal loss, none -a few wounded. This engagement took place on last Thursday.

It is reported on what seems to be good authority that Fourest, with his entire command, was captured near Woodbury on Saturday. The Federal troops, it is said, laid an ambuscade on each aide of a lane, and then sent out a small party who allowed themselves to be taken by Forener. These soldiers reported that the Federals were retreatirg, and Forrest pushed on after them, and when he had fully entered the lane found himself hemmed in on all sides, and surrendered. Our readers must take this latter story for what it is worth. The first is undoubtedly true.

Patronizing Rebula

The administration is beyond question shaking the confidence of the public in its integrity by tolerating such a state of affaigs as is indicated in the following extract. We hear very bitter complaints made by loyal men about the conduct of some of its agents in this place :

To the Editors of the Louisville Journal: LA GRANGE, August 27, 1862. The loyal citizens of Oldham cannot be indifferent to the course pursued by those in power, in employing agents to purchase horses, make saddles, and per-form other duties for Government, and making keepers of railroad depots and telegraph operators out of those avowedly disloyal. The fact is so notorious that the offices hereabout are almost exclusively given to secessionists, that the ques-tion is: Does it require a fincture of treason to qualify one for office; or do the dispensers of loaves and fishes con-sider all wisdom locked up in the craws of rebels? These vampires, while sucking the blood of what they call dead corperations, are constantly imparting to the rebels information and otherwise aiding them in their treasonable plots. The consequence is, they steal horses, cut telegraph wires, and then cut dirt for Secessis, to join the rebel army. And the efforts of loyal men to prevent such acts are constantly thwarted through the management of these pampered puppies. The time has come when none but true and loyal men-who acknowledge the existence of the Government - should hold any office in the Government. Es-pecially, there should be no one who is in the least suspected of disloyalty, in any place or position, through which contraband things may be conveyed with facility to the enemy, or treasonable information imparted to them. From the Louisville Detnocrat of Sunday Fight near Richmond, Ky.

We learn from a reliable gentleman who arrived from Lexington last evening that the stage and passengers arrived at that place yesterday at noon, from Rich-mond, Kentucky. He reports that the driver was the bearer of a letter from the Postmaster at Richmond, Mr. P. B. Bal-lard, dated at half-past six o'clock A. M., to Dr. Todd, the Postmaster at Lexington, the substance of which is as follows: The rebels, two thousand strong, sup-posed to be under Scott, appeared within three miles of Richmond, when Col. Metcalfe took command of all the cavalry in and about Richmond, went out and attacked them, driving them back and capturing one of their heavy field pieces. It was reported the rebels had an infantry orce of from 8,000 to 20,000, and it was expected they would advance and make an attack on the town, yesterday morning. The driver and passengers report having heard heavy firing of artillery from a short time after they left, until they reached Lexington. When the train left Lexington, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, for this city, a messenger arrived and reported that the whole rebel force had been driven back 6 miles, and were still fighting and retreating. Col. Jacob's cavalry took an active part in the fight. We did not learn any particulars as to the loss on either side. Gen. Nelson is in command of all the forces.

LATER.-Advices by telegraph two or three hours later than that by the cars, informs us that Nelson is still driving the enemy before him, but the extent of the casualties on either side are not given. We learn, however, that Col. Warner, of the 18th Kentucky, was killed.

A subterraneau railway is now in an advanced state of construction, running about four and a half miles under the city of London. The road will be handsomely lighted with gas.

THE SALE OF REBEL REAL ESTATE FOR Taxes .- Under the act of Congress authorizing the Government to sell real estate in the insurrectionary States, on non-payment of the direct taxes, pro-ceedings are soon to be instituted in Vir-Under direction of J. C. Underwood, Fifth Auditor of the Treasury, the Tax Commissioner appointed for the State of Virginia by the President, John Hawkhurst, John Lewis and Lewis Ruffner are to sell at public vendue certain rebel estates in the counties of Fairfax and Fauquier, the proceeds to be put into the Treasury.

Persons now absent from their estates can return, and by proving their loyalty to the Government, and paying interest and a percentage for expenses, redeem their property. The estates of the emi-nent rebels, John A. Washington and Gen. Lee, will be among the first thus disposed of.
