NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—Our forces recently made a reconnoissance within five miles of Tarboro, N. C., and found rebel troops heavily massed. Deemed it impolitic to attack them.

Stonewall Jackson is encamped at Petersburg Hills, seven miles from Winchester. His force is estimated at from twenty-five to forty thousand, with forty pieces of artillery.

It is reported that the rebels occupy, in force, Thorton and Chester Gaps, in rear of Burnside.

Small pox is raging in Staunton, Virginia, and vicinity.

Rebel General Villipigue is reported dead, at Fort Hudson, of pneumonia.

New York Brokers are again selling gold. Nine hundred thousand dollars was exported to-day.

Governor Brown threatens to impress negroes to work on fortifications at Savannah, Georgia, unless they are immediately forthcoming.

Federal forces are in possession of the entire coast of Texas.

Hernando, Miss., is occupied by Federal troops. Mississippians are running their negroes into the interior.

Steamer Eugenie, Cairo and Memphis packet, was sunk off Plum Point Bend. Fifteen persons, mostly crew, drowned.

Rebels reported fortifying Jackson, Miss. Large reinforcements arriving there from Arkansas.

Texas.

A wholesale butchery of loyalists is going on, it would seem, in Kerr, Kendall, Kimball, and Gillespie counties, Texas, by order of the rebel authorities. If the accounts of the seventy-five Texas refugees who recently reached New Orleans are correctly stated by our correspondents, the rebel soldiers in Western Texas, under directions to take no prisoners in these loyal counties, are putting every male inhabitant to the sword, and laying waste the whole country. The four counties in question have been proclaimed by General Herbert in a state of rebellion against the Confederate States, and his soldiers are hounded on to a work of general carnage and rapine! Despairing of the conversion of the people by peaceful measures to the cause of the rebellion, this savage officer carries his point with fire and the sword, determined to extirpate the communities he cannot proselyte. The refugees in New Orleans say that their friends and neighbors looking with the utmost anxiety for the result of Col. Hamilton's mission to the North, and hundreds are watching and awaiting for the day when the old flag will again wave in triumph over the soil of Texas.

We learn that while the rebels were in possession of the country around Richmond, Madison county, Kentucky, a squad of the scoundrels called at the house of a lady who resides six miles from town late at night and called for the man of the house. The old lady went to the door and told them there were none but women about the house, when one of them dismounted and held a cocked pistol to her breast, demanding the pistols that her son wore while in pursuit of John Morgan, last July. They did not get the pistols, but stole several of the lady's finest horses. Another lady was sick in the house, and was so badly frightened that she died a day or two after. The old lady alluded to is the mother of Gen. G. Clay Smith, and gave the rascals a terrible scolding while the pistol was still pointed at her breast. One of the scamps in the crowd was her son-in-law, a son of A. G. Talbott, and went off with the rebel Price, leaving his family, consisting of a wife and six children, unprovided for. Dr. C. C. Smith, a brother of the General, is the man the rebels were after, but fortunately he was in Richmond at the time. They told Mrs. S. that they intended to "make away with him." With great difficulty she managed to warn him of the danger next morning, and he hid in cellars until they all left.—Louisville Journal.
