Another Rant of Rebels—Splendid Affair near Picketon. Official to Adjutant General Finnell: HEADQUARTERS 5TH KY. VOLUNTEERS, CAMP FINNELL, NOV. 19, 1862.

I arrived here (Picketon, Ky.) on the 5th.

I expected to have a little brush with the rebels at Coal Grove, eight miles below here. I marched the last day eight miles through the mountain paths and got within four miles of them before they received notice of my movements.

Please inform our friends through the Journal that the rebels have no longer a hold in eastern Kentucky.

Kentucky Rebels Made to Foot the Bills—Union Men to Have Indemnity for the Past.

LOUISVILLE, NOV. 17.

While the rebel army occupied Kentucky, a wealthy and prominent rebel citizen gave information which led to the seizure of several hundred dollars' worth of bacon belonging to a Union man, the rebel army taking the meat and paying for it in Confederate scrip.

This policy will be pursued in similar cases hereafter in Kentucky.

Eleven steamers arrived to-day from above with portions of Gen. Morgan's Cumberland Gap army. The army remains here long enough to be paid off.

A Loyal Tennessee regiment formed a portion of Parson Brownlow's congregation on Sunday.

Addressing himself, in his sermon to them, he advised them to obey their officers until they arrived in East Tennessee, after which they shall exercise their own taste in settling old scores with the rebels in that section.

MIDNIGHT DESPATCHES.

Rebels Removing the Inhabitants from Fredericksburg!

Gen. Sumner Demands the Surrender of Fredericksburg!

Large Force of Guerrillas at Aquia Creek and Leesburg!

New York Money Market, &c.!

HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF POTOMAC, NOV. 22.—Last night was spent by the rebels removing the inhabitants from Fredericksburg, and throwing up earthworks. Deemed injudicious to open on the city to-day.

Our encampments, which were in range of the enemy's guns, have been removed further back from the river. The rebels fired a few shots, to which we made no response.

General Sumner demanded the surrender of Fredericksburg yesterday.

White's rebel guerrillas, twenty-five hundred strong, appeared in the vicinity of Leesburg.

At Aquia Creek a number of guerrillas were seen last night, their intention appeared to be to murder and plunder.
