## PAYING INTEREST ON BONDS

## LOUISIANA FINANCES AGAIN

The Harper's Ferry Arsenal Property is fair

WASHINGTON, July 3.—The Department is paying interest on \$300,000 of bonds at the First National Bank in New York, to-day.

The report of the Commissioners on bonds for bonded goods in transit, has been referred to the Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Sawyer, who will decide upon what returns he receives from a two weeks' visit to Massachusetts.

Governor Kellogg of Louisiana, has again telegraphed to the Federal Attorney-General regarding Louisiana affairs.

The President has recognized John Dehaven Martin, Vice Consul from Spain at Charleston.

The United States has filed a bill in chancery in the United States Circuit Court for West Virginia, to enforce the vendor's lien on the Harper's Ferry property sold in 1869. As soon as this case is decided, the United States will begin an election suit against the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, which has been running its trains over government property, it is claimed, without authority. When the two suits are determined, the property and franchises will again be put up at public sale.

The World's special from Rome says the Uighi has failed to form a cabinet. The situation is reported gravely critical. The Dook party at Pesth has coalesced with the Left Center and formed a Liberal party of overwhelming parliamentary power.

Secretary Bellap and Richardson left to-day for Philadelphia.

The opinion of Judge Williams in the Howard case will not be made public until next week.

## THE MARKETS.

### Domestic.

New York, July 3.—Stocks dull. Gold steady at \$145. Money easy at 46%. Exchange, long, 9; short, 10. Government dull and steady. State bonds very quiet.

### Foreign.

London, July 3.—Consols, 95%; new £s, 90%; 10-40s. A favorable ending of the fiscal year will sustain American securities. Bullion increased 267,000. Paris, July 3.—Rentes, 60%.

Liverpool, July 3—noon.—Cotton quiet and steady; uplands, \$10; Orleans, \$6.91d; sales, 12,000 bales; speculative export, 2,000 bales; September delivery, \$14. Later—Cotton easy; official quotations; uplands, \$10; Orleans, \$6d.

## AN EARTHQUAKE IN ITALY.

London, July 3.—The American residents of London will celebrate the anniversary of the Declaration of Independence by a dinner at the Langham Hotel to-morrow.

Rome, July 3.—The crisis in the Ministry continues. Ugolini has failed to form a cabinet. The King has summoned Count Cambryana to undertake the task.

FLORENCE, July 3.—A dispatch from Bellona, five-and-a-half miles north of Vevey says: Shocks of earthquake were felt this morning, and a volcano near Formosa, three miles from Bellona, which had been quiet for some time, opened, and the water of the lake in the vicinity was boiling.

## GENERAL NEWS.

KANSAS CITY, July 3.—The shipment of Texas cattle east from Wichita, Ellsworth and other points in Kansas has commenced. There are six thousand head at Wichita and one hundred and fifty thousand head on the way to that point from Texas. According to the official railroad reports, there are also large numbers at Ellsworth, and small droves at other points.

CINCINNATI, July 3.—A special dispatch from Bloomington, Ind., says George Buskirk, President of the First National Bank, shot and mortally wounded Aaron Rose, a bartender in that town, last evening, for refusing to sell him whiskey.

Add New York.

There were six cholera deaths in Memphis yesterday.

A tornado struck Galesburg, on the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railroad yesterday. Several houses were prostrated, and three children killed. Storms are also reported from Cincinnati and St. Louis, with several fatal accidents. Many houses were prostrated, and the wheat crop badly damaged.
