Wall Street Forgeries--Rumored Arrest of Prominent Brokers.

Report of the Inspectors in the Wawaset Disaster.

Sheriffs in Hot Pursuit of the Coast Murderers.

Further Revelations by Irving, the Nathan Murderer.

SAN FRANCISCO, September 1.—Three sheriffs are in hot pursuit of the band led by the Mexican, Valesquez, which murdered three citizens of Monterey. They have been to the Hernandez valley, on the coast range of mountains. A reward of \$10,000 has been offered for their capture.

Irving gives the names of two men associates with him in the Nathan murder, Dan Kelly and Caleb Gordon. Kelly struck the blow. Irving denies that he was in prison at the time of the murder, and says if he ever reaches New York he will produce papers and a memorandum book which he took from Mr. Nathan's safe with his own hands.

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—The principal in the New York Central Bond forgers is one Charles J. Williamson, who is believed to be identical with the notorious Ross and Wright. He appears to have been dealing through various brokers to a very great extent, principally in New York Central stocks of 15%, and Buffalo, New York and Erie first mortgage bonds. Williamson is an outside man, and whether all the bonds just mentioned are forged or not, or merely a cover by which he was enabled to issue forged bonds, it is impossible to tell. The defectors think it advisable for any persons who have bought any of the classes of bonds just mentioned since the date of last payment of interest, to have them examined at the several offices of the companies, to have their genuineness attested.

It is reported in Wall street that a certain bank has been victimized to the extent of half a million dollars with these forged bonds, and it is further reported that the arrest of several prominent operators in Wall street may be shortly looked for with reference to this worthless paper. Since the arrest of Brown, a large quantity of the bonds have been discovered, as follows: Found on the person of the prisoner, \$80,000; found with one firm on Broadway, \$30,000; with another firm on Broadway, \$20,000, making in all \$130,000. It was rumored last night that other stocks had been counterfeited, and that business will be partially suspended in Wall street tomorrow until the truth is known. Williamson has the alias of H. H. Williams, and is said to have been discharged, years ago, from the position of bookkeeper for Brooks Bros., for speculation and forgery. Every effort is being made to secure his arrest.

NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—The schooner Martha, of Bangor, twenty-nine days from Mobile, with a cargo of timber, has arrived in tow of the wrecking steamer Resolute. The schooner sprung a leak during a storm on the 27th. When she was taken in tow, she was four miles from the beach, with the sea breaking over her fore and aft.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.—The Inspector of Steamboats have made public the special report of the Wawaset disaster. They recommend the prosecution of the Potowmuck Ferry Company and the Captain and mate, and the suspension of the engineer. They charge the Ferry Company with carrying more passengers than allowed, and the engagement of officers who did not bear certificates. The report charges the Captain and mate with accepting places without proper documents, want of discipline is generally charged, and an undue anxiety on the part of the Captain to save the boat instead of the passengers. The Secretary of the Treasury has referred the report to the Solicitor General for his action with a view to the prosecution of the alleged culprits.

WAIFS FROM THE WIRES.

A fire at Rehita, Ind., yesterday, destroyed a distillery and stock to the amount of \$25,000.

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The Steamboat Inspectors have made their report in regard to the Wawaset disaster on the Potowmuck. The report charges the officers with carrying more passengers than allowed by law, with inefficiency and attempting to save the boat instead of the passengers, and recommend that the captain, mate and engineer be prosecuted.

On Wednesday last Mr. James McCarty, of Titus county, was accused by a party of men, and abused in such a manner that he died from the injuries on the following morning. The master is at present undergoing investigation.—Jefferson Democrat.
