An Extensive Strike Among Railroad Engineers.

Particulars of the Fratricide at Dayton.

The Mexicans indulging in their Common Pastime.

Boston Merchant's Books Seized
---Liquor Decision.

CLEVELAND, O., December 27.—The locomotive engineers on the Cleveland and Pittsburgh Railroad, have struck. Passenger trains are somewhat delayed, and all the freight trains are on the sidetracks. The strike is unsanctioned by the Brotherhood.

PITTSBURGH, December 27.—The engineers on the Pan Handle, Pittsburgh, Fort Wayne, Chicago, Erie and Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Pittsburgh, all operated by the Pennsylvania Central, have struck. Every effort has been made by the officers to supply their places, and it is expected that trains will run as usual.

CHICAGO, December 27.—The engineers and firemen have struck.

CINCINNATI, December 27.—The railroad shops have all stopped work to allow the mechanics to take the striking engineers' places. No freight trains have left since noon yesterday. The officials had no intimation of the strike until noon yesterday. Reports of attempts to throw trains off are current. The engineers disavow any intention to interfere with trains. They simply want the wages current before December first. The depots here and elsewhere are full of freight and passenger trains.

DAYTON, O., December 27.—The particular of the Stowe fratricide and the subsequent hanging of Henry Stowe, show that the two brothers, with some companions, after drinking whiskey freely, commenced shooting at a mark. John Stowe insisted on loading the rifle for each competitor, and Henry contended that each man should charge the gun for himself. Henry, however, acceded to the demands of John until it was his turn to shoot, when he demanded that the rifle be given to him to load. High words followed, in the course of which Henry charged John with dishonesty in not putting any ball in the gun when last loading. John called Henry a liar. When Henry shot John dead with a revolver, Henry was immediately seized by the remainder of the party, numbering four men, dragged to a mill, and hanged to a limb. The company then repaired to the office and took a drink, and upon returning, found their victim dead. Seeming to realize for the first time what had happened, those who participated fled, and have not yet been captured. The parents of the brothers, who live in Pennsylvania, were informed at once of the terrible affair, and arrived yesterday afternoon and took charge of the remains of their sons, who, it seems, were their only children.

LOUISVILLE, December 27.—The striking engineers and brakemen did not notify the officials of the Jeffersonville, Mitchell and Indianapolis railroad of their intended action until the trains were ready to start yesterday afternoon. After much trouble the 3 o'clock P.M. train was got out in charge of the Master Mechanic of the road. The strike will cause a suspension of all freight and night passenger trains. Arrangements have been made to run out daily two passenger trains in charge of engineers not belonging to the union. Horace Scott, General Superintendent, thinks by Monday he will be able to resume a portion of the freight trains. Several of the strikers told a reporter yesterday that the members of the Union on the Jeffersonville, Mitchell and Indianapolis railroad, sent a deputation to Pittsburgh several days since which met other deputations, who, together waited on Mr. McCullough, General Superintendent of the Pennsylvania company and remonstrated with him against the reduction. He referred them back to the officials of their divisions.

It is understood that the members of the union on the Jeffersonville road awaited a telegram from headquarters at Pittsburgh before inaugurating the strike. The telegram was received yesterday morning, and the strike commenced at two o'clock. All trains starting out before that time were brought safely to their destination. No railway is reported.

The Sheriff of this State and Indiana have given assurance that all men willing to work shall be protected, and the public shall not be deprived of the use of railroads.

CHICAGO, December 27.—The train dispatches at the offices of the Illinois Central, Northwestern, and Pittsburgh, Fort Wayne and Chicago Railroad, in this city, deny the report that the engineers and firemen of these roads have struck, and assert that there is no cause for a strike on these roads as wages have not been reduced.

The engineers of the Great Eastern Railroad have struck, as heretofore reported.

MATAMORAS, Mexico, December 27.—A fight occurred to-day in the market place between some of Cortina's men and the police, in which a policeman was shot and instantly killed. The murderer took refuge in Cortina's headquarters, but the General surrendered him to the police, who lodged him in prison. Cortina's friends say he will be installed as Mayor of this city on New Year's day, which will double his load to another fight, as both parties are armed and determined.

An affray occurred a few days ago in Monterey over the municipal election, in which several were killed and wounded.

Another disturbance occurred in Tampico, and the Mayor has been imprisoned by the State troops.

BOSTON, December 27.—The books of Jordan, Marsh & Co. have been seized for alleged frauds on the revenue.

ELIZABETH, N. J., December 27.—Judge DePue decided to-day in the case of prominent hotel keepers and other liquor dealers in Plainfield, that local ordinances permitting saloons could not protect them against the operation of State law.
