GALVESTON.

The "You Tickle Me and I'll Tickle You" Delegation at Kansas City—Hasb, Wine and Gas—Organization of Lee County.

GALVESTON, June 19.—A News special from Kansas City, of the 19th, says: The Houston delegates have purchased three train loads of produce in this city. The banquet last night was the grandest affair of the kind I ever saw. A fine brass band played while the guests, three hundred at least, including the delegates, enjoyed one of the most extravagant feasts. Many toasts were given and responded to. The most beautiful and eloquent response was made by Colonel Flournoy to "Our Guests." Every one of the city guests expressed much gratification and pleasure at his remarks, which were most timely and appropriate. Mr. Van Horn also responded in timely remarks.

CONGRESS.

The Levee Question to be Investigated During the recess of Congress—Appropriation for Custom House Superintendency notified.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—In the senate, Mr. Clayton, from the joint committee on Mississippi levees, reported a resolution authorizing the committee to sit during the recess of congress to investigate the condition of the Mississippi levees, and the propriety of the government assuming control of the same. Laid over.

The house passed a bill fixing two hundred and fifty thousand dollars as the limit of the expenditures on the Atlanta, Ga., custom house.

The president has settled the vexed question of the internal superintendency for the southern district, composed of Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana. He directed that Hon. K. R. Cobb retain the position.

CUBA.

Landing of a Large Supply of Arms and Ammunition on the North Coast—Communication Established Between the Insurgent Forces.

New York, June 19.—A Havana letter, dated the 13th, says that advices from Porto Principe, from private sources, are of considerable interest. Trustworthy information, through insurgent sources, report a revival of the expedition under Angulla on the north coast, armed with four thousand Remington and Peabody arms, six pieces of mountain artillery and a large quantity of ammunition, all of which was safely landed and communication established with the forces of Maximo Gomez. This is said to be the most important expedition gotten up by the insurgents since the first year of the war.

FOREIGN.

Arrival of Rocheport in London—Cardinal Antonelli's Visit—The Pope and the Italian Government.

LONDON, June 19.—Rocheport arrived here last evening. There was no demonstration.

ROME, June 19.—Cardinal Antonelli is suffering from an attack of the gout and is very weak.

At the reception of cardinals by the pope to-day, he mentioned that proposals had been received emanating from exalted political personages, looking to a reconciliation between the pope and the Italian government. He declared, however, he would yield nothing, and that any concession on his part would be injurious to the church and society.

FROM CHINA.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 19.—The steamers Vancouver and Lord of the Isles, from China, have arrived. The Lord of the Isles brings nine hundred and fourteen Chinese passengers, and the Vancouver six hundred and thirteen. The latest Chinese papers state that the vessel lost in the China sea with all on board, was the steamer Scott and not the bark Scott, from this port, as was supposed.

THE PENNSYLVANIA CENTRAL.

Meeting of Stockholders—Report of Colonel Thomas A. Scott—Net Earnings of the Various Roads Owned by this Company—Great Increase of Transportation Facilities.

PHILADELPHIA, June 16.—An adjourned meeting of the stockholders of the Pennsylvania company was held in this city yesterday. Colonel Thomas A. Scott, president, presented his report showing the operations of the company for 1873. The following is a statement of the net earnings of the various roads operated by this company: Pittsburgh, Ft. Wayne and Chicago railroad, \$3,522,932.37; New Castle and Beaver valley road, \$192,514.73; Lawrence railroad, \$76,911.33; Erie and Pittsburgh, \$484,398.74; Cleveland and Pittsburgh, \$1,797,913.10; Jeffersonville, Madison and Indianapolis, \$446,199.88. Total net earnings, \$6,518,170.

The final results of the Pennsylvania company are paying all expenses, rentals, interest, etc., shows a net profit of \$1,258,310, out of which dividends have been paid on preferred and common stock \$570,000, leaving a balance of \$688,310. The lines are now amply supplied with facilities to meet not only present demands, but also a much increased volume of business, and the condition of the track and rolling stock will enable the business to be moved with economy and dispatch. On the Fort Wayne road forty-nine per cent of the entire line was re-laid with new rails, including 6,000 tons of steel rail, and twenty-eight per cent of ties were renewed. On the Cleveland and Pittsburgh thirty-five per cent of line was re-laid with new iron. In addition to the lines enumerated, and which are operated under leases, this company has also worked during the past year, on account of proprietary companies, the Indianapolis and Vincennes, the Ashland, Youngstown and Pittsburg, the Toledo, Tiffin and eastern railroads, and completed portions of the Mansfield, Coldwater and Lake Michigan railroad.

The New Discoveries at Troy.

(From the New York World, 11th.)
According to the latest news from Athens, the judges rejected on the 15th of May the demand of the Turkish government for one-half of the treasure which Dr. Schliemann discovered at Hisarlik and conveyed to Athens. The arrangement now seems to be that Dr. Schliemann is to employ one hundred to one hundred and fifty laborers for three or four months at Hisarlik, and that whatever is found by them is to be the property of the Turkish government. In the meantime the Turkish government has not been inactive. The large slabs on the road which were discovered at Hisarlik at the depth of thirty feet have been removed, and below that pavement a much more ancient pavement of large stone slabs has now been brought to light. While the stratum which Dr. Schliemann and other euhemerists assign to Piram and his family extends only from twenty-three feet to thirty-two feet below the surface, these new excavations reach from thirty to fifty feet. Those who believe that there must be some kind of historical foundation for all mythological and epic poetry, will have to assign this new stratum to Laomedon, Priam's father, whose Ilion was destroyed by Hercules "with only six ships and few or men."
