ROBBERS REPULSED.

A Gang of Train Robbers Board and Attempt to Rob a Train at Ranger, on the Texas & Pacific, but are Confronted by Rangers and Take to Their Heels with a Small Wad from the Texas Express Company.

The east-bound through passenger train, No. 4, was boarded yesterday morning at Ranger station, one hundred and twenty miles west of here, by a band of eight heavily armed men. The train was pulled into that station on time, at 12:15 a. m., and had not fairly stopped when two of the bandits sprang into the engineer's cab while he was oiling the locomotive, or rather superintending it, as the fireman did it, and leveling their pistols on him, commanded both him and the fireman to get in front of them into the Texas Express car, which they did with the utmost alacrity. Presenting their pistols on the express messenger and the station agent, they made them fork over \$50 they had in sight, while making a settlement. In the meantime several others of the gang boarded the cars, and they were on the eve of going through the engine train when four rangers, employed on the road, who had been aroused by the alarmed passengers, sprang out on the bandits and poured a volley from their rifles after them, as by this time they began a hasty retreat, but returning the fire at a lively rate, though without serious effect, only grazing the right hand of the station agent. The night was very dark, and they were soon lost to view. Between thirty and forty shots were exchanged, and the only damage done so far as is known was the splintering of the coaches by the bullets of the bandits. All the time the fighting was going on the passengers were busily engaged in secreting their valuables which would have fallen into the hands of the robbers had it not been for the appearance of the rangers, who almost stampeded them. A bullet passed through the hat of Engineer White cutting off a lock of hair. They did not have time to pay their respects to the Pacific express, and so that company escaped.

THE ROBBERS were no masks but were painted a copper color. The leader of the gang is a tall, slender looking man, with dark mustache and hair of the same color. When they first took the train two of them walked towards the mail coach while the leader called to them to let it alone. They were armed with rifles and six-shooters and were quick in their movements. The rangers got out of the train and went in search of the gang, who were opposed to have horses near at hand. They found in the bushes close by a lighted lantern. They were closed by the same eight robbers who robbed the train at Blum station, on the Gulf, Colorado & San Fe road, a few weeks ago, and it is the general opinion of the officers here that it is the remnant of

JESSE JAMES' gang, and that since the death of their leader they have fled from Missouri to Texas. The officers here spotted eight men during this week who were in attendance on the races and who were riding splendid horses, yet, while they regarded them as suspicious characters, they did not feel that they were warranted in arresting them. It appears that they were after the Pacific Express car, which had an unusually large sum of money aboard, but that through mistake they entered the car of the Texas Express company.
