LITTLE HELPS.

The Visiting Baby.

When a baby accompanies the mother on a little visit, a very convenient little bed is made by placing a large bureau-drawer with a pillow and soft covers. It is very comfortable and can be raised to the level of the mother's bed by placing it on two chairs.

Cleaning Photographs.

Soiled photographs are so displeasing to everybody, and few know that they can readily be cleaned.

Moisten a clean cloth with warm water to which has a little ammonia has been added. Wring the cloth out very dry and rub gently over the photographs, drying immediately with a soft dry cloth.

Drying Lace Curtains.

Carefully clean your brass curtain-ropes and when the curtains are ready to dry, carefully slip them on. Then hang up as usual and pull straight along the line. Do not let them hang uneven from time to time, as they dry. When dry enough, take down and iron with a hot iron. Place the curtains on a flat surface, place the curtains as evenly as when you borrowed your neighbor's washboard.

A Trick Worth Knowing.

If the table-cloth is quite clean, except for one spot, dip a folded towel between the table-cloth and the padding and on the towel place an empty bowl. Turn the table-cloth directly over the bowl. Pour boiling water through the stain until it fades away. Place another towel over the wet place and iron until dry.

Baked Macaroni Flavored With Meat.

2 Cupfuls of Macaroni
 1 Cupful of Tomatoes
 1/2 Cupful of Parsley
 1/2 Cupful of Onion
 1/2 Cupful of Left-Over Meat and Gravy
 1/2 Cupful of Cut Onion
 1 Cupful of Grated Cheese
 1 Teaspoonful of Butter
 1 Teaspoonful of Salt
 1/4 Teaspoonful of White Pepper
 1/4 Teaspoonful of Paprika

Break the macaroni into one-inch or two-inch pieces, or use elbow macaroni; put into a saucepan with three quarts of boiling water; boil for thirty minutes then blanch with cold water. Brush a baking dish with oil or with butter, put in the macaroni, and pour over the sauce, made as follows:

Sauce: Put the bacon into a frying-pan; add the onion, and fry until a light yellow; not brown and hard; add two cupfuls of tomatoes, salt, pepper and paprika, and half a cupful of hot water; boil for five minutes; add cheese and butter over the top; pour in a hot oven and bake for ten to twenty to twenty-five minutes, or until a light brown.

BLACK AND TAN CANDIDATE FAVORS EDUCATIONAL AMENDMENT.

Tyler, Texas, Oct. 23.—Hon. H. Capers, candidate for governor on the Black and Tan Republican Ticket, spoke in Tyler Tuesday night to a large and appreciative audience. In a clear and forceful manner he presented the issues which are advocated by his party.

He urged all supporters of the Black and Tan Ticket to vote for the Educational Amendment to the Constitution, explaining that the people should be more concerned about the education of the masses than about any other subject. Among other things, he said that the rural schools could not be improved and that without more local support. That the teachers should be better paid and that the teachers' profession should be made so attractive that it would draw to it the best talent in the country.

A. J. TURNER IS DEAD.

Dies Suddenly Friday Morning—Funeral Was Held From Family Home.

A. J. Turner, a prominent figure and a well known amusement promoter of Dallas, died suddenly in the office of the Benevolent Order of Buffaloes up stairs over 2415 Elm street, Friday at 11:45 a. m.

Turner was seen Friday morning about 10 o'clock by a Dallas Express representative seated at the table in Whitaker's Cafe, 2415 Elm Street and spoke to him. There was nothing indicative about his facial expressions at the time to lead one to believe that the end was so near; however, he appeared to have been in deep meditation. Not quite two hours from the time stated above Turner was dead.

About 10:30, or thereabout, he left the cafe and went up stairs to the office of the above named Order, sat down near a window in front of the building; here he saw Jesse Ivey, a friend, passing on opposite side of the street and called him; and upon his arrival on the scene Turner had walked over to a lounge in the office and sat down, and by the time his friend reached him he was stricken with what appeared to have been a convulsion. His groans attracted the attention of Dan James who was seated at a desk in the office, he turned around to see what the trouble was and found Turner in an apparent dying condition. He immediately called an alarm which brought many of his friends up, also phoned for a physician. Drs. Porter and Porter answered the summons and rendered medical aid; he was revived temporarily and sat up on the side of the lounge on which he was lying brim- ing back with pain. Every thing was done to stay life, but a struggle between life and death was only in the case momentarily. And at 11:45 the end came.

Mr. Turner was a member of the Benevolent Order of Buffaloes and Dallas Union Lodge No. 1949, Grand United Order of Odd Fellows. He was well known and respected by all who knew him and had lived in Dallas a number of years. He is survived by a wife and a sister.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2:30 from the family home on Allen street, Rev. C. W. Abington officiated.

WHEAT TO SECURE WHISKEY; CHARGED WITH BURGLARY.
