C. S. CARRIER ASSAULTED BY VILLAGE BULLY.

Jackson, Tenn., Stirred by Brutal Exhibition.

Jackson, Tenn., March 31.—Mr. A. J. Bailey, a veteran letter-carrier of the city of Jackson, was assaulted by a white ruffian on Wednesday morning on North Liberty street while on duty in the discharge of delivery of mail. Without warning, his assailant came from his front door and after asking Mr. Bailey if he had any mail for his family and was answered "No, Sir," approached him in an ugly mood, and informed him that he must beg his wife an apology for some insulting remarks that he had made to her on Monday last.

Mr. Bailey, surprised by the charge, told him that he had made no insulting remark to his wife. Before Bailey could speak another word he was struck over the left eye with a pair of brass knuckles. The blow felled him to the ground in an unconscious condition. The assailant continued to assault him in this manner until another white man came up and demanded him to cease beating Bailey. The ruffian remarked, "If the dam nigger had attempted to fight I intended shooting him full of holes."

The case was brought before the city court and was promptly dismissed on the grounds of not having jurisdiction, since it was a federal case. Mr. Bailey has been confined to his home suffering intense pain in his left eye, which the specialist says there is no hope to save it. The people are very much wrought up over this unprovoked assault and are watching the government as to its action. This man, Littrell runs a credit tailoring establishment and is supported almost alone by a certain element of Colored people. If they should withdraw their support from him he would have to close in a week's time.

Not only are this same bully made an attack upon and offensive Colored woman, was arrested and made to pay a small fine, but it seems that this did not deter a certain element of Colored people from giving him their orders.

All civic organizations in the city will assist in the prosecution of this "Mississippi" to the fullest extent of the law.

The white people of Jackson have joined in denouncing the brutal conduct of this village bully. Jackson is a city of law-abiding people, white and Colored alike.

27 STATES, 63 CITIES ACTIVE IN N. A. A. C. P. DRIVE.

The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, 70 Fifth Avenue, New York, today announced that its countrywide drive for a quarter of a million members was well under way and that twenty-seven states and sixty-three cities were already represented.

Among the southern states in which the drive is being actively carried forward are Alabama, Louisiana, Kentucky, Florida and Virginia and South Carolina.

Among the large cities of the country in which the drive is under way are New York, Chicago, Richmond, New Orleans, Washington, Denver, Kansas City, Seattle and Spokane, Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse, Detroit and Minneapolis.
