COTTON MARKET SUFFERS SLIGHT DECLINE.
(By A. N. P.)
New Orleans, La., Sept. 1.—The net results of last week's trading in the cotton contract department at 12.6c, and declines of 13 points on middling spots, which closed at 12.0c. The high prices of the week were made on the opening session, while low prices came at the middle of the week. At the highest the more active months in the contract market were selling at 12.7c, and at the lowest they were 49 to 53 points under. October traded at high as 12.7c and as low as 12.2c. The market moved over a range of 47 to 51 points.
The outstanding features of the week were concerned mainly with the growing crop. It was claimed that deterioration was general and severe in nearly all sections of the belt and particularly severe in Texas where the drought continued. At the end of the week private crop observers were sending messages from Texas placing the percentage of condition at only 50 of normal, in many cases, and as low as 47 and 48 in a few cases. These figures compared with 62 as the condition of the Texas crop in the government returns to July 25. Severe deterioration was reported in the eastern section of the belt while in some localities, too much rain was complained of. Weevil damage was reported in some areas and even in Texas, in spite of the drought conditions there.
