AN ORDINANCE.
Be it ordained by the Council of Spartanburg,
now assembled, and by authority of the same,
That any slave or slaves that may be need of the
Town of Spartanburg, on the Sabbath, proposing to
sell, without a written permit, any poultry, eggs,
fruit of any description, or any of the products of the
farm or poultry yard, heretofore prohibited, or if
said slave or slaves, in order to avoid the effect of
the ordinance, shall sell to a fellow-servant, residing
in town, such articles of commerce as are herein
prohibited, shall be apprehended by the marshal,
and confined in jail, and there confined until his
or her master shall release them by the pay-
ment of the costs and other expenses incurred in
doing so: Provided, Such release is made by 10
o'clock on the first Monday following.
Be it further ordained, That any slave or slaves
who are herein prohibited, shall be apprehended by
the marshal, and confined in jail, and there confined
until his or her master shall release them by the pay-
ment of the costs and other expenses incurred in
doing so: Provided, Such release is made by 10
o'clock on the first Monday following.
Be it further ordained, That any person or per-
sons who may buy or own any slave or slaves,
without a written order from the owner, shall be
liable to a fine not exceeding twenty five dollars.
Be it further ordained, That any person or per-
sons who shall walk with a slave, except the aged, decrepit
and infirm, or if any slave or slaves march a cigar
or pipe in the street or other public highways, on
the Sabbath or other days, the slave or slaves thus
found, shall be liable to a fine of every offence
twenty dollars, at the discretion of the marshal,
whose duty it shall be to inflict the same.
