WASHINGTON, May 11.—The Senate has passed the Appropriation Bill, after striking out the amendment heretofore adopted, preventing parties from receiving any pay until offered by the Senate before the passage of the Bill.

Senator Corwin made a speech, declaring that those who interposed to prevent the Southern States from being represented were disunionists, and that opposition to restoration was superinduced by fear of losing political power.

North last night, taking with him the indictment against Jefferson Davis.

Late yesterday afternoon, the grand jury of the United States Circuit Court in session, brought in a true bill against Jefferson Davis for treason, and adjourned until the first Tuesday in June, to meet in Richmond.

THE HABEAS CORPUS ACT.—A Committee of conference having agreed on the amendatory habeas corpus act it has passed both Houses and only awaits the signature of the President to become a law. It protects every officer of the Federal Government, who, acting under orders, made what is known as arbitrary arrests during the war. It also removes all suits brought by aggrieved parties against such officers from the State courts to the Federal courts.

A memorial was presented in the Senate to day from citizens of Maryland, praying that they may be indemnified from assessments made on them by the Maryland authorities for the building of a school house for the education of negro children. The case seems to be an outrageous one, and is a specimen of many doubtless to be heard from the Border and Southern States.

KENTUCKY.—Judge Ballard, of the United States District Court at Louisville, Kentucky, issued an order for the arrest of Gen. J. C. Davis, the new military commandant of Kentucky, for interfering with the course of public justice in disobeying a writ of habeas corpus in the case of Henderson. Gen. Davis resisted the execution of the order, which is made returnable in May. Attachments were also issued against Generals George H. Thomas, R. W. Johnson, and General W. D. Whipple, Provost Marshal of Tennessee, returnable at the next regular term. Separate attachments have been ordered to be issued against General S. C. Davis and Lieutenant Colonel W. H. Cooper for resisting the United States Marshal in the discharge of his duty. The Marshal has notified President Johnson of the condition of affairs.

WASHINGTON, May 14.—Mr. Chandler, of New York, offered a resolution, endorsing the President for having by his veto power, protected the people of the country from the acts of wicked and mischievous men.

NEW YORK, May 9.—Advices from Panama, state matters quiet during the bombardment. The Spanish Admiral refused to receive from the Danish Consul General, a note to the effect that the Danish Government would hold Spain accountable for damages to property and citizens during the bombardment. Active preparations for the reception of the Spanish, were being made by the fortifications.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—The President has approved the bill for encouraging telegraphic communications between the United States, the West Indies and Bahama Islands.

The House passed that section of the Tax Bill, fixing the duty on cotton at five cents. The House was occupied in debate on a constitutional amendment proposed by the Reconstruction Committee. Several members delivered thirty minute speeches on the proposition. Raymond, of New York, was willing to accept the report, provided the third section was stricken out. McKee, of Kentucky, gave it his approval.

The United States Circuit Court opened yesterday. Judge Underwood delivered his charge to the jury, and dwelt on the necessity of bringing the leaders of the late rebellion to a speedy trial.

A private letter from Newbern, N. C., says that at the United States District Court, now in session in that city, a white man has just been convicted of passing counterfeit national currency, a black man having been the principal, if not the only witness against him. The writer, speaking of such testimony, says:—This marks a new era, in the history of North Carolina, under the civil rights principle.

WASHINGTON, May 8.—The Senate for a considerable part of the morning was engaged in a discussion on the joint resolution for preventing the introduction of the cholera. The Legislative Appropriation Bill was reported.

The House to-day was engaged in discussing the constitutional amendment of the Reconstruction Committee, that being the special order for the day. Thaddeus Stevens led off in support of the committee's report; said that only nineteen loyal States were wanted to ratify the amendment; repudiated the idea that the views of States lately in rebellion should be counted in its adoption. Several speeches, each thirty minutes in duration, were made on the subject, showing decided differences of opinion among the Radicals on the committee's report. The House refused to postpone and allow the consideration of the Tax Bill by a vote of 51 to 82.

The following dispatch was received in Washington, May 5, dated Vicksburg, to Gen. Howard:

An assistant sub-commissioner of the Bureau, Lieut. J. B. Blanding, was assassinated at Grenada on the night of the 30th ultimo.—Every effort will be made to ferret out and bring the murderer to justice.

PARDONED.—President Johnson has signed the pardons of Gen. Harry Hays, of Louisiana, and J. B. Latite, of Charleston, formerly rebel agent in Europe.

JUDGE SHEFFEY, in the Circuit Court of Nelson last week, decided—

1st. That contracts made during the existence of a de facto government were valid and binding, notwithstanding the subsequent overthrow of that government.

2d. That the sale of a slave in Virginia, in the Confederate lines, prior to the 10th of April, 1865, was valid and binding, notwithstanding the emancipation clause in the Alexandria Constitution.

The 10th of May, the anniversary of the death of Stonewall Jackson, was observed generally in Virginia, by a suspension of business, and by an ovation to our departed heroes.

A negro woman in Mississippi confesses to starting her four children to death, "as she was tired of supporting the trait."

ANOTHER VETO.—President Johnson has written a veto message on the bill admitting Colorado, but has not yet sent it to Congress.

The Senate, after a warm contest, confirmed ex-Sheriff Parker, of Louisiana, as surveyor of that port. The Louisiana Radicals have labored earnestly for his defeat.

The New York Tract Society has turned over to the American Missionary Association the control of the 1200 colored people at present living on the estate at Arlington.

Onions, which a year ago were in demand at \$1.25 per bushel, are now selling at Bristol, Rhode Island, for two cents a bushel. The highest price that can be got is ten cents.

The excess of westward bound travelers over eastern bound, that passed through Chicago during last month is estimated at 10,000. This is an index to the flow of emigration to the West this spring.

The Italian squadron is composed of 71 vessels, 25,820 horse power, carrying 1197 guns and 20,627 sailors. The transport squadron consist of 24 ships, of 4690 horse power, and manned with crews numbering 3220.

No deaths of cholera have occurred in New York city or at Lower Quarantine since Friday. Dr. Bissell's report, dated on board the hospital ship on Friday evening, shows that she then had one hundred and six patients on board.

The New York Tribune says that the Germans in America, over 5,000,000 in number, are about to form organizations to promote the establishment of a united and Republican Germany. We hope the "G. R." will not follow in the wake of the "I. R."

SAN FRANCISCO, May 8.—Intelligence from Los Angeles states that Fort Goodwin, in Arizona, was taken by 2000 Indians, and its garrison of one hundred and twenty men put to the sword. There was one exception, the party who escaped was out hunting at the time, and saw the fight at a distance.

A farmer in Maine applied kerosene oil to a very valuable pair of four year old oxen to kill lice. Both of them were soon after sick, and one of them has died. On being opened, the smell of the oil was quite strong, and without doubt it caused the sickness and death of the animal.

A portrait gallery is to be formed on an extensive scale during the Paris exhibition of 1867. A building for the reception of portraits will be erected in the Champs Elysees, and the celebrities whose likenesses are to form the gallery will be grouped according to ages they illustrated, and their portraits will be classed by centuries.

ONE OF THE PRE-ADAMITES.—The skeleton of a monster animal was discovered in a mine about seven miles from the Dubuque, Iowa, on the 27th ult. The animal could not have been less than twenty feet in length, and may have been much larger. Some of the joints measured five and a half inches in diameter, notwithstanding they were greatly wasted away.

PURE ESSENCE OF COFFEE.—The Cincinnati Gazette says that "pure essence of coffee" is now made in that city out of the "cheapest, dirtiest molasses," which is boiled until it ropes, cooled in pans, and when hard, broken up and pulverized. Ground rye is then mixed with it; after which it is boxed up each box being sold at eighty cents, and labelled "pure essence of coffee."

The Secretary of the Treasury presents his monthly statement of the public debts as follows: Debt bearing coin interest, \$1,186,092,841.80; bearing currency interest, \$1,188,313,541.62; matured and not present, \$877,729.64; bearing no interest, \$452,392,755.54; Total, \$2,827,676,871.60. The amount in the Treasury is \$137,987,028.82, and the debt less cash is \$2,689,689,842.78. There is a decrease since last month.

ANOTHER PIECE OF RADICAL RASCALITY CONSUMED.—The iniquitous act to limit the elective franchise in Tennessee, which has caused so much excitement in the Legislature of that State, was finally passed in the Senate on the 2nd. It disfranchises nine-tenths of the people of the State, and is one of the most reckless and unprincipled outrages ever perpetrated upon the liberties of a people. Eternal infamy will cling around the names of those who have thus trampled upon the rights of the people and so ruthlessly defied and set at naught the spirit of our free institutions.

General Orders, No. 25.

2ND. All officers on duty as Provost Marshals, Post Commanders, or otherwise connected with the military service, are instructed to send information of the locality and condition of such graves, and of any breach of this order, to the Quartermaster General.
