

From Europe.

LONDON, August 11.—Napoleon demands from Prussia the rectification of the French frontier by its extension to the Rhine as it was marked prior to its disturbance in 1814.

The military and naval preparations which are being carried on in France, induce the belief that the Emperor will make war if his demand is not complied with.

The New York Herald's special from London of the 9th says there is great excitement this evening caused from a supposed attempt to blow up the two Houses of Parliament.

There were 1,063 deaths from cholera in London last week.

LONDON, August 11.—An armistice has been agreed upon by Austria and Italy on the basis of the cession of Venetia to the latter.

The King of Prussia, at Berlin, on the 10th in reply to a congratulatory address, said that Prussia had drawn the sword not only for her own independence but for the reorganization of Germany.

BERLIN, August 6.—At the sitting of the Chambers to-day the members cheered the King and the Prussian victories.

VIENNA, August 6.—It is expected that a definite treaty of peace will soon be signed by the Austrian and Russian plenipotentiaries at Prague.

FLORENCE, August 6.—The Italian and Austrian Generals met at Cormorn in Austria to negotiate. France takes no part in the pending armistice.

MACE BEAT GOSS in a prize fight match in 21 rounds.

LONDON, August 8.—Affairs between Austria and Italy are again assuming a threatening attitude.

LIVERPOOL, August 8.—The ship Danube, bound from Bristol to the United States, was bound at sea. The crew arrived by a Mobile vessel.

WASHINGTON, August 9. Major Generals Hunter and Delafield have been placed on the retired list.

The order of the War Department reorganizing the Military Department was promulgated to-day. Among them Seofield commands the Department of the Potomac, embracing Virginia and West Virginia.

SARATOGA, August 9.—There are 600 delegates to the Union Convention. Judge Homer Nelson, War Democrat, was elected temporary chairman.

By direction of the Secretary of War the provost marshal general's bureau will be abolished immediately and the archives turned over to the Assistant Adjutant General Townsend by the 20th instant.

The Mexican minister has received dispatches from the Juarez Government, dated Chihuahua, July 28th.

NEW ORLEANS, August 10.—Gov. Throckmorton was inaugurated Governor of Texas at Austin on yesterday.

There have been twenty-four deaths from cholera for the twenty hours ending at six o'clock this morning.

Gov. Welles issued an address to the Loyal Louisianians, speaking in soothing terms of the ex-Confederates, and approving the Convention of 1864.

G. & C. R. R.—THE BRIDGE.—We are gratified to learn that the Railroad Bridge over Broad River is expected to be completed during this month.

WASHINGTON COLLEGE.—The Staunton Spectator states that the contributions to the "Lee Endowment" fund are increasing constantly.

THE CROPS.—Monday last being saleday, a large number of the citizens of the District assembled here.

The Philadelphia Convention.

PHILADELPHIA, August 12. The great wigwag for the National Convention will be completed by Tuesday.

There was quite a stir to-day over the report in the New York Herald that Gov. Curtin, of Pennsylvania, had secretly called for 20,000 militia for service during the time the Convention sat.

PHILADELPHIA, August 13. Upwards of six hundred delegates to the Convention have arrived.

WASHINGTON, Delaware, August 11.—The Republicans nominated James Riddle for Governor and John L. McKim for Congress.

CINCINNATI, August 11.—There were 38 deaths from cholera yesterday.

NEW ORLEANS, August 11.—The grand jury made a report of the testimony on the late riots. It says, speaking of the convention, that it was an assumption of power by these men.

CINCINNATI, August 15.—Fifty-four deaths on Saturday and 68 on yesterday, of cholera. The Board of Health declare the disease epidemic.

NEW ORLEANS, August 13.—Cholera deaths for forty eight hours, ending this morning, 50.

LONDON, August 13.—The armistice between Italy and Austria, which expired on Saturday last, has been renewed for four weeks.

RALEIGH, August 10.—The Convention to-day chose as delegates to the Philadelphia Convention, W. A. Graham, George Davis, R. C. Purvey, and George Howard.

ST. LOUIS, August 9.—Fort Larnie advises state that the Indian war has recommenced. The Indians killed several white men near Fort Keno and stole a great number of cattle.

Several attempts to introduce white labor in the cultivation of cotton, in Alabama, have been made and failed.
