STATE OF SOUTH-CAROLINA.

In the House of Representatives,

DECEMBER 21st, 1793.

WHEREAS the Commissioners of public  
Accounts, have reported, that they can-  
not proceed to the investigation of the Treasury  
Accounts, respecting special Indents, without  
knowing the outstanding amount thereof in cir-  
culation:—Therefore,

Resolved, That all holders of special Indents  
be directed, and required, on or before the first  
day of November next, to deliver the special In-  
dents in their possession to one or other of the  
Commissioners of the Treasury, who are to give  
receipts for the same, and to report to the Com-  
missioners on public accounts, on or before the  
tenth day of November next, the amount by  
them respectively received, and also to the Leg-  
islature, at their meeting in November next.  
And that all special Indents not rendered into  
the Treasury as above, on or before the first day  
of November next, shall be, and the same are  
hereby barred.

Resolved, That public notice of this resolution  
be given in the several Gazettes in this State,  
once every three weeks, until the first day of  
November next. And that the Delegates of this  
State in the Congress of the United States, be re-  
quested to cause this resolution to be published  
in one or more papers in the cities of Philadel-  
phia and New-York, and that provision will be  
made for the expenses attending such publica-  
tion.

Ordered, That the resolution be sent to the  
Senate for their concurrence.

Congress of the United States.

IN SENATE,

Friday, January 10th, 1794.

The Senate resumed the consideration  
of the report of the committee, on the peti-  
tion of Conrad Laub and others, respec-  
ting the appointment of the Honora-  
ble Albert Gallatin, a Senator of the Uni-  
ted States; which report is as follows:

"The committee to whom was refer-  
red, the petition of Conrad Laub and  
others, stating, that the Honorable Albert  
Gallatin, at the time he was elected a Sen-  
ator of the United States, had not been  
nine years a citizen of the said United  
States, as is required by the constitution;

"Report,  
That the committee have conferred  
with Mr. Michael Smyser, agent for the  
petitioners, and with Mr. Gallatin; that  
Mr. Smyser has declared, that the peti-  
tioners are ready to adduce proofs in  
support of the petition at such time as the  
Senate may think proper to appoint, that  
Mr. Gallatin states no objection to the  
trial's commencing at an early day.

"The committee therefore recommend,  
that the Senate adopt the following reso-  
lution:

"Resolved, That be assigned for  
hearing the petition of Conrad Laub and  
others, respecting Mr. Gallatin's right to  
a seat in the Senate, and that messrs. Gal-  
latin and Smyser, be furnished with a copy  
of this resolution."

On motion,  
It was agreed to postpone the report of  
the committee, and to take into consid-  
eration the following resolution.

Resolved, that a committee of elections  
to consist of seven be appointed to report  
rules for receiving petitions and conduct-  
ing enquiries relative to the qualifications  
of a senator—and that the petition of  
Conrad Laub & others be referred to the  
same committee, to state the facts, and  
that they be authorized to send for persons  
and papers.

On which a motion was made and se-  
conded to postpone this motion, and to  
take up the following,

"That be a committee to ascer-  
tain and state to the Senate the facts rela-  
tive to the time when the honorable Albert  
Gallatin became a citizen of the United  
States, and that the said committee have  
power to send for persons and papers.

Whereupon a motion was made and se-  
conded, to postpone the preceding, and  
to take into consideration the following  
motion:

"Resolved, That a committee of elec-  
tions be appointed, and that the petition  
of Conrad Laub, and others be referred to  
it, to report their opinion on the merits  
of the said petition."

And after debate

The Senate adjourned to 11 o'clock on  
Monday morning.

Monday, January 13.

Mr. Dandridge notified the Senate that the  
President of the United States hath this  
day approved and signed a bill which ori-  
ginated in the Senate, entitled, "An act  
making an alteration in the flag of the  
United States."

Ordered, That the Secretary acquaint  
the House of Representatives therewith.

The Senate resumed the consideration  
of the petition of Conrad Laub and others,  
respecting the appointment of Mr. Gal-  
latin to be a Senator of the United States.

On motion

Ordered, That a committee of electi-  
ons, to consist of seven be appointed, and  
that the petition of Conrad Laub and o-  
thers be referred, without prejudice as to  
any questions which may upon the hear-  
ing, be raised by the fitting member, as to  
the sufficiency of the parties and the mat-  
ter contained in the petition, to the same  
committee, to state the facts, and that  
they be authorized to send for persons and  
papers; that Mr. Bradley, Mr. Ellsworth,  
Mr. Mitchell, Mr. Rutherford, Mr. Brown,  
Mr. Livermore and Mr. Taylor be this  
committee.

Agreeable to the order of the day the  
Senate took into consideration the subject  
of amendments to the constitution of the  
United States.

And,

It was agreed to consider at this time  
the following motion:

"Resolved by the Senate and House  
of Representatives of the United States  
of America in Congress assembled, two  
thirds of both Houses concurring, that  
the following article be proposed to the  
legislatures of the several States as an  
amendment to the constitution of the Uni-  
ted States; which when ratified by three-  
fourths of the said legislatures shall be va-  
lid as part of the said constitution, viz.

"The Judicial power of the United  
States shall not be construed to extend to  
any suit in law or equity, commenced or  
prosecuted against one of the United  
States by citizens of another State, or by  
citizens or subjects of any foreign State."

And after debate,

The further consideration thereof was  
postponed until to-morrow.

On motion,

Ordered, That the further consideration  
of the motions of the 24th Dec last, and  
9th of Jan. inst. on the subject of amend-  
ments to the constitution, be postponed un-  
til to-morrow, and that the several mo-  
tions on this subject be printed for the  
use of the Senate.

The Senate resumed the consideration  
of the motion made the 3d instant, respec-  
ting certain statements from the Secre-  
tary of the Treasury, and, having agreed  
to sundry amendments thereon, it was  
adopted as follows:

Ordered, That the Secretary of the  
Treasury lay before the Senate,

A statement of the goods, wares and  
merchandise, exported from the several  
States from the 1st day of July 1792, to  
the 30th day of June 1793, specifying the  
quantities and value of each kind, and the
