PIRACY!

THE schooner DELIGHT, the property of Manuel Antonio Martin, of the Island of Bona Vista, was on the 18th of October last, while lying at anchor in the road of the Island, forcibly entered and carried off by JOHN DUNHAM, JOHN MURRAY, a man by the name of DODGE, and one other person, name unknown.—This vessel was sold to M. A. Martin, by William McNeill, who came to Bona Vista in her, from Madeira.—She was built in the county of Matthews, State of Virginia, and was registered at New-York, the 16th April, 1793.—Her name was printed on her stern—Her dimensions as follows: 36 feet 6 inches keel, 16 feet 6 inches beam, hold 6 feet 2 inches, her burthen 54 tons.

At the time of their entering the vessel, there was a black man on board by the name of Balthazar, whom they carried off with them. John Dunham was mate of the vessel under Capt. McNeill, prior to the sale of her, and the other persons were mariners. Dunham is a married man, and has a family at Nantucket.

The cargo of the vessel consisted of the following articles.—2 casks containing 74 pieces Linen; café Wine-Glasses; 1 bale containing 9 pieces Broadcloth; 1 do. 9 do. 79 pieces Cotton, (needle worked)—33 do. inferior, 2 mays of Salt; she had seven small arms and some pistols.

If any person can give any information of this vessel, or any part of the property, so that it can be recovered, or the offenders brought to justice, they are requested to inform Messrs. JOSEPH ANTHONY and SON, Philadelphia; MURRAY and MUMFORD, New-York; CLARK and NIGHTINGALE, Providence; or HEAD and AMORY, Boston.

Mr. DAVIS,

TO you is presented for publication, the enclosed extract of a letter, of the 4th instant, from a Philadelphia citizen, whose life in the late war, when real objects were at stake, exhibits incontrovertable testimonials of his love of country, his obedience to the obligations of morality, and his personal military exertions in the cause of reason and of liberty.—I have introduced this detail of the writer's character, because the inchoate passionate proceedings of one branch of an august body, detailed by the public papers, and heightened by private correspondence, which every mail circulates through this state, manifests unequivocally that the spirit of internal discord and foreign war, is affectionately estimated by some deputies of a people, who hold the peaceable occupations of the harrow and the plough to be the certain paths to national weight and to individual happiness, and who did suppose that our constitution general, and constitutions particular, afforded a positive warrant of peace and its blessings to them, which never could be interrupted by the egotism and passion of men, clothed with public authority, aided by the desperation of their seconds, whose noise is become as disgusting, as is their courage to fight and power to pay those who have courage to fight. Whether we are to be deprived of the abundant blessings we possess, will depend on those to whom our public concerns are entrusted. May the God of Nature endue our Congress with wisdom, and by his special interposition, save our nation from the menaced deep calamity, by inspiring the House of Representatives with a recollection, that they are the trustees of a people who love religion, obey the truths of morality, and like our Blessed Saviour, believe peace among mankind to be the highest grade of felicity allowed to the human race.

THE EXTRACT.

“OUR worthy friend, I ought to say father, from his goodness to us, has lived too long: A second war opens to his view, and catches him like the past in enterprising commercial adventures.—I with his situation now was correspondent to his situation then—but alas! injured by the capture of his vessels, and injured by the paper payments received from his country, he was reduced low.—When he recommenced on the return of peace the business to which he had been bred, again his honesty flourished, and he had again fair prospects from the slow but certain gains of frugality and industry.—His numerous family urged him into an extension of his foreign business, and pending his second adventure on his enlarged plan, war appears!—war unnecessary and apparently courted!—but so it is—for could you hear the debates of the Congress, you would think that our country's happiness is at an end.—Revenge governs our politicians—or perhaps in its garb, personal interests, personal animosity, and base ambition.—Our Legislators are too highly paid—They become proud and mighty of spirit, and think that as they are well off so long as they can hold their places, which they count certain so long as the passions and not the judgment of their constituents can be reforted to, and therefore hold cheap the public welfare.—Virginia ought to set the good example of mixing honor with coin, in return for the services of Congress. I am told your own State Senators and State delegates have but twelve shillings per day in money, and the balance in honor; and they are generally speaking, superior to the United States's House of Representatives.
