Congress of the United States,

In Senate, Tuesday May 13th, 1794.

ORDERED, that Rufus Putnam, Manassah Cutler, Robert Oliver and Griffin Green, do, upon the third Monday of December next, show cause to the Senate, why so much of the grants of land to them the said Rufus Putnam, Manassah Cutler, Robert Oliver and Griffin Green, pursuant to an Act entitled "An act authorizing the grant and conveyance of certain lands to the Ohio Company of associates," shall not be declared void, as may interfere with and be sufficient to satisfy the claims of the French settlers at Gallipolis.

Ordered, that the delivery of a copy of the above order to Rufus Putnam, Manassah Cutler, Robert Oliver, or Griffin Green, and the publication of the same, one month, in one of the Gazettes printed in this City, shall be deemed sufficient notice thereof.

UNITED STATES.

NEW-YORK, May 24

At a general meeting of the owners, masters and consignees of American vessels, who have had their property seized at St. Pierre, Martinique, for the purpose of collecting the different circumstances attending this illegal procedure, in order to form a statement of facts, and publish them on our arrival in America, for the information of our countrymen, do state the following circumstances: viz.

That having sailed from America between the month of November and March last past, arrived within the above periods at this place; that we were transacting our business as we were accustomed to do, having imported nothing contraband, or in any respect violated the laws of neutrality.

That on or about the third day of February, the British fleet and army appeared off this island, and commenced the siege of it; that they landed their troops on or about the fifth day of February, at Trinity, and on or about the seventeenth of the same month, appeared, landed, and took possession of the town—the following day officers were sent on board our respective vessels, our sails were unbound, our colours torn down, ourselves with our mates and seamen were taken out of our vessels without being permitted to take a single change of clothes, secure our cabins or trunks, and were carried on board a ship of war; and after undergoing a contemptuous examination, were conveyed on board a prison-ship; here we were crowded together to the number of two hundred and fifty persons, in a small ship with a single deck, without any kind of provisions except what we received from our friends on shore, and even that with great difficulty, as they forbid any boat coming along side the ship. We remained in this situation three days; during which time we made applications to the commodore, Capt. Nugent, of the ship of war called the Veteran, and begged he would supply us with provisions, or at least let us go on shore to provide it for ourselves, and we received this laconic reply—That he should give us nothing—that we were a set of damn'd rascals, and might starve and be damn'd. That at length, a commissary was appointed to supply the seamen with provisions, and we were permitted to go on shore and live at our own expense; some of us were permitted to go on board our vessels, to look after our trunks, bedding, clothes, &c. and found that our cabins had been shamefully plundered, our trunks and chests broke open and robbed of every thing of value, our papers, that were of no use to any person but ourselves, torn and destroyed; and, in fact, a line of depredations exhibited that could have been only produced through the effects of malicious revenge and the frenzy of intoxication.

Our vessels were moored together so close, that in fifteen days many of them chafed through and sunk; some drifted to sea and never returned; others drove on shore and bilged; our unfortunate seamen who were unable to live on shore, or their captains to support them, died daily on board the prison ship; some were seized and put on board the ships of war. That after more than a month's suspense, we were informed a court of vice-admiralty was established to try us (or rather to condemn us) and we were monitored to appear and answer to the libel; almost as soon as we heard the court appointed, when our preparatory examinations ought to have preceded its issuing, which convinced us that as the judge had commenced illegally, we could expect no justice from him: that another month had almost elapsed when we were told that we must give security to prosecute our claim, for what he called double costs, to the amount of 60 johannes, to be certainly forfeited should we be condemned: this we unanimously
