War-Office of the United States,
May 24, 1796.
THE following Rules, explanatory of those published the 15th February, 1789, are to be observed by all persons entitled to Lands, in pursuance of resolves of Congress.
Every certificate of the acknowledgment of a deed or power of attorney, either before a notary public or other magistrate, null, in addition to what is usual, set forth that the person making the acknowledgment is known to the notary or other magistrate; for which purpose words of the following import must be inserted in the certificate.
"And I do more over certify that the said A B making this acknowledgment has been for personally known to me."
If the notary or other magistrate has reason to believe that he is the person he represents himself to be, he will also certify to.
And if the proof be made by a witness or witnesses, he or they must swear to some general state of their knowledge of him, which matter must be set forth in the certificate; and the notary public, or other magistrate before whom the acknowledgment is made, must also set forth that the witness or witnesses has or have been for upwards of personally known to him.
If a justice of the peace is employed, the clerk of the court of the corporation or county must certify that such person is a justice of the peace of the county or corporation as the case may be, and that full faith is due to his acts as such.

1. From Savannah by Sunbury to Newport Bridge, once a week.
2. Receive the Mail at Savannah every Saturday by 9 A. M. arrive at Sunbury by 6 P. M. and at Newport Bridge on Sunday by 10 A. M. Returning. Leave Newport Bridge on Sunday by 3 P. M. and arrive at Sunbury in the evening, and at Savannah on Monday by 6 P. M.
3. From Newport Bridge by Darien and Brunswick to St. Mary's, once in two weeks.
4. Receive the Mail at Newport Bridge every other Sunday noon, and arrive at St. Mary's the next Wednesday by 5 P. M. Returning. Leave St. Mary's the next day, Thursday by 8 A. M. and arrive at Newport Bridge the next Sunday by 10 A. M.
Note 1. If either of the routes are altered by law during the continuance of the Contract, the Contractor is to observe such alterations in carrying the mail, and his pay is to be increased or diminished, in proportion to the distance increased or diminished by such alteration.
