for the consumption of the troops at Michilimackinac, De-

advance, and at each of the other posts, for the term of
at least three months in advance, in good and wholesome
provisions, if the same shall be required. It is to be un-
derstood, that the Contractor is to be at the expense and
risk of supplying the troops at each post, and that all losses
sustained by the deprivations of an enemy, or by means
of the troops of the United States, shall be paid for at the
price of the articles captured or destroyed, on the deposit
of two or more persons of creditable char-
acters, and the certificate of a commissioned officer, as-
certaining the circumstances of the loss, and the amount
of the articles for which compensation shall be claimed.
