THE EXCHANGE OF PRISONERS.

We heartily rejoice over the release of our fifty officers at Charleston, and are willing enough their fifty compensating Rebels should go back in exchange. At the same time, we are utterly unable to perceive on what principle, or in virtue of what decision of our Government, the exchange was effected.

Not a more curious muddle has been made uring all the war than in this exchange business. We are not going into the history of it-space being valuable-but advert to the well-rememhered fact that all negotiations with the Rebels on the general subject of exchange were finally broken off last winter, mainly in consequence of disagreement on two points; (1) as to the number of duly paroled and exchanged prisoners on either side, and (2) as to the recognition by the Retal authorates of negro soldiers as prisoners

It was understood that the Government would It was understood that the Government would asse waived differences on the first point if the Rebels would have yielded the second; but they declined. Pending the diplomacies the exchanges were stopped by an order of the War Department and were never resumed. That is to say, they were never re-tuned formally by revocation or suspension of that order, much less by agreement between the parties; but from that time to this result. this, special, irregular, unauthorized exchanges of limited numbers of officers and men have

Such exchanges were rather numerous in the Such exchanges were rather numerous in the West and Southwest, and have even gone on under the eye, and apparently by express direction, of the War Department, at City Point. Every one of these exchanges was a clear gain to the Rebels in two ways—giving them well men for sick and starved, and yielding tacity the question as to negro troops. These irregular exchanges have continued even since the Fort Pillow massacre.

We hold to-day 90,000 and more Rebel prisoners of war. Of our men the Rebels have perhaps 50,000—cert inly less than 60,00. If, therefore, terms of a general exchange could be agreed on, the cause of the Rebellion would gain 30,000 men—equivalent to a reinforcement of twice that number to their armies, because we should send them healthy, well-fed men, ready to shoulder a musket at once, in exchange for whom we should receive a sickly and mainly disabled body of men.

But there is another element in the question

But there is another element in the question which deserves consideration. Nearly 100,000 egrees are in the military service of the United Sales, more than 50 900 of whom wear the uni-form and fight for the flag of the Republic. The residue are employed as teamsters, laborers, ser-

Efforts are making towards general enlistments in the insurgent districts to reduce quotas for the loyal States; in addition to which General Canby has recently issued an order for filling the ranks of the Louisiana regiments from the plantations. If these efforts receive the encouragement and co operation of the War Department, the number of co ored troops may be largely increased in a short time. reased in a short time.

Right here interposes this question of exchange, involving and resting upon recognition or denial by the Rebels of our right to entist blacks, and their treatment of prisoners. It has remained now for nearly two years nominally unsettled—set led practically by the unswerving obstinacy of the Rebels and hesitation of the Government. -settled by the repeated murders and enslave-ments of colored troops lighting for the Union, for no one of which has there been retaliation on

We have got to meet it some time-and there is no time like the present. For the new enlist-ments press it upon us in such a form that we cannot escape it without humiliation and dis-grace. The Government has no right to ask a egro to enter its military service while it denies sim the ordinary sa eguards of military service. The Union has no claims on its colored citizens; the States have still less on citizens of other

As matters now stand, each is asking and one is compelling the black man to march into the field under the two-fold perit of death by the chances of battle and death or slavery if captured. He knows it, and in many thousands of tances has proved generous enough and heroic enough to it e that donoic peril. Not can we can ect that on such conditions the Govern-ment should obtain has f the number of men

who, were they once assured of recognition and protection as soldiers, would fink to us unfurfed standard at through the rebellious States.

If, then, we are deaf to other considerations, the demands of self-interest appeal to us to be just to the negroes. We must do it in order to get the mer. We can afford to make a bargain to surrender 90,000 Rebel prisoners in exchange for 60,000, if we seems the rights of our covered. for 60,000, if we secure the rights of our colored to ops by such an agreement, and by securing their rights of fer them an inducement to callst.

The Rebel authorities are very glad to get back their fifty officers, and will get afty or five thousand more, if they can on the same terms—erms which involve no surrender of the purpose to murder colored pri-opers, which they have

GRAND HAUL OF COUNTERFEITERS

Eleven Presses Seized—Immonse Amount of Connterfeit Money Found-All the Plates Captured-The Whole Gang Sent in Irons to Washington.

In Irons to Washington.

The citizens doing business in the large cities of the United States have long been emisarrassed by the circulation of immense quantities of a unterfeit notes, on several of the most important hanks of the country, and the United States Trasury, principally of the twenty-dollar issues and of the fifty-cent postal currency.

Several attempts have been heretofore made to get possession of the plates and arrest the counterfeiters, but without success. Large sums of the counterfeit twenties could be traced to the different paymasters' departments, many of them so well executed that it was impossible to distinguish them from the genuine bills; still no clue could be obtained as to where they were manufactured.

The immense quantity of the bogus currency

clue could be obtained as to where they were manufactured.

The immense quantity of the bogus currency which flooded the country at length drew the attention of the authorities at Washington, and Coloned L. C. Baker, so widely known as a skillful detective, and who is now Chief of the National Detective Police, was invested with full power to examine the matter, arrest, commit, or make such disposal of prisoners as in his judgment should seem best, and also to call to his sid, in addition to his own force, such assistance as might be necessary in any department to which the interest of the service might call him. With this authority from headquarters, Colonel Baker, who had been in the Government service over three years, summoned his efficient force and immediately set about ferreting out the conterfeiters. Believing, from the wast amount of spurious money in circulation in the West, that the manufactories were located in some of the principal cities of this department, he left Washington, accompanied by his well-tried men, to commence operations here. Arriving in this city on Friday last, he was not long in obtaining such information as enabled him to make a successful effort, by which he secured a variety of places in the cities of St. Lonis, Indianapolis, and Nauvoo, at all of which places the business was found to have been extensively carried on, the larger share of it being done in this city, where the regiment have been extensively carried on the larger share of it being done in this city, where the principal manufactory and machinery were located. DESCRIPTION OF THE PLATES.

The first plate shown us was a five-doilar plate on the State Bank of Iowa.

The second was a three-dollar plate on the City Treasury Warrant of St. Louis, which was a well-executed and produced work, which in many instances good judges of our city currency were unable to detect. For this plate a large reward had been offered, but no cine could be obtained as to who was the possessor of it.

The third secret was a two-dollar plate on the Bank of Rutland, Vermont, which was also well executed, but did not bear the mark of as fine workmanship as the City Treasury plate of St. Louis, yet was sufficiently well executed to deceive even those who professed to be good judges of money.

The fourth and most important of all the plates captured was the United States twenty-dollar greenback series, which has perhaps produced nearly as many bills as the gennine plates. The process of working this note was somewhat different from the others, as to complete the bill requires four different plates, the first of which works the whole face of the note except the red star and figures two and cipher near the centre of the bill, but which are somewhat separated from each other. The first of these plates is remarkably well engraved, and with proper paper and ink would produce even a finer appearance on the face of the bill than the gentine playe.

The second plate on the face of the bill contains much less work, and is designed to fill in in the large two and cypher near the centre of the bill, and also rome other smaller work. The last plate necessary to complete the face of the note is the red star upon the right of the bill, which is also well executed, and is worked last, with red ink. The face of the bill having been completed, a fourth plate is used, to finish the work on the back of the bill; after which, if there be no defect in the press-work, or what is usually termed "working off," the bill is put through another process, called the "swaxing process, to modify the color of she ink, soften the paper, and otherwise piepare the bill for market.

At the time the plates of the twenty were captured, the force were busily engaged in printing, and, unfortunately, one of the gang had to be shot before a complete arrest could be made. They were at this time working on the press at Indianapolis.

The fifth of the regular series of plates was one on the Pittsfield Bank, State of New Hampshire, of the denomination of two dollars, and which was well executed, and had an extensive success. The eixth and most important plate of the lot, except the twenty and fifty-dollar plates, was that of the fifty-cent postal currency, which has been a source of so much annoyance. In this series only two plates were used one to work the face of the check and the other the back. Both plates bear marks of having been used very

extensively, as in one or two places the engraving and solid work are literally worn down, having, as has been admitted by one of the prisoners, been in use day and night.

At the time of the capture of the plate, a whole tea chest of the fifty-cent postal currency, amounting to probably fifty or sixty thousand dollars, was found in one place, and one of the prisoners.

Seventh plate. This was comparatively a new one, and was splendidly executed, and is, perhaps, one of the most beautiful counterfeit plates that has ever been executed in America. It is a ten dollar new issue. Transport plate had only

For printing the back of the ten a different plate was used, but one which was equally well executed.

The tighth plate was of the denomination of twenty dollars, on the Citizens' Bank of Louisiana, also tolerably well executed. Plate No. ten was of the denomination of twenty dollars, on the Bank of New Orleans. Plate No. twelve was a twenty-dollar bill on the State Bank of Tennessee. Plate No. thirteen was of the denomination of ten dollars on the Bank of Louisville. The fourteenth and last plate discovered and seized was a splendidly executed plate for printing the new issue of fitty-dollar Treasury notes, and which had evidently not yet been used much. CAPTURE OF DIES.

In addition to the wholesale capture of plates on the different banks above described, several important diss were also taken possession of, the instof which was a twenty-five cent die, hand-somely executed and well calculated to deceive. A second one was a die used for making tre-dollar gold pieces, and the last and most im-portant was the die used in making twenty-dollar gold pieces. This had been the most extensively used of any of the dies.

THE PHISSES, INC. PAPER, ETC.

The number of presses taken were cleven in all, the largest of which weighted thirty-six handred pounds, and was used for working off the twenties, and was taken at the manufactory some seven miles from the city. Another was a small the press, which have marks of traving been considerable used.

Among the finest of the presses was a lithographic press, very beautifully finished and used for printing the content of postal currency. The record lithographic press was much heaven, evidently intended for printing tens and twenties. In addition to these was an old-fashioned press, probably used before the business bad attained as present flourishing condition. The rest of the presses were all well finished and perfectly autipred to the work for which they were inadapted to the work for which they were in
