General Sherman has finished the work assigned to him by Lieutenant-General Grant before that inveterate and hard-working chief had cause to use it in his general plan of campaign.

By such a movement he hopes to prolong the contest, and weaken General Grant so much as to force him to suspend the offensive, and thus prolong the war.
