THE SOCIAL UNION.—An adjourned meeting of the Social Union was held last evening in the lecture-room of the Second Reformed Dutch Church, Seventh street, above Brown. Mr. D. W. C. Moore, President of the Union, occupied the chair. The meeting was opened by the singing of hymn, after which J. Y. Mitchell, of the Central N. L. Presbyterian Church, offered prayer. Addresses were delivered by Mr. Ward, Rev. Mr. Lowensbury, and Dr. Oaler. The conclusion of a board of managers was then referred to a committee of three. The committee reported a list of names, and a board of managers was elected, consisting of fifty persons—twenty-five of each sex—the clergyman of the various Evangelical churches of the city to be ex-officio members of the board. Dr. Oaler reported resolutions looking to the erection of a hall for the uses of the society, and the obtaining of funds for that purpose, which were adopted. A hymn was then sung, and the meeting closed with the benediction.

PENNSYLVANIA MILITARY LEGION.—A number of returned officers and privates, who served in the late war, have formed themselves into an organization similar to the Scott Legion of this city. The organization was projected by General John P. Ballier, late Colonel of the 98th Pennsylvania Volunteers, and the movement received the approval of the following gentlemen:—27th, 73d, 75th, and 18th Pennsylvania Infantry, the 5th and 12th Pennsylvania Cavalry, and the 29th New York Infantry. Members of nearly all the regiments recruited in Pennsylvania joined the organization, and which will be known as the Pennsylvania Military Legion. Regular meetings are held on the first Thursday in every month.

HIGH SCHOOL ALUMNI.—A meeting of the Committee appointed at the last February meeting of the High School Alumni to protect the interests of their Alma Mater, was held yesterday afternoon, President Lynd, of the Central, in the chair. It was determined to prepare a report for the next meeting of the Alumni, setting forth the dangers to which the High School is subjected by the attacks of its enemies, and suggesting the proper remedies to overcome them. The next meeting of the Alumni will doubtless be a highly important and interesting one.
