

MATTERS OVER THE RIVER.

THE CHOLERA.—The apprehension that this dreaded scourge has arrived on our shores has created considerable fear, and incited fresh activity among the citizens of Camden in the work of placing the city in a proper sanitary condition.

NEW BRIDGES.—At the recent session of the New Jersey Legislature, an act was passed authorizing the construction of a new and much needed bridge across Cooper's creek, in the county of Camden, immediately at the point where the street commonly called State street strikes the said creek.

DETERMINED ON SUICIDE.—A Mrs. Wilson, aged about fifty years, and who resides on Washington street, below Tenth, committed suicide last evening by taking arsenic. A physician was called in as soon as the discovery was made, but no aid could be rendered. The deceased had made four different attempts at suicide. The cause is said to be domestic difficulty.

ATTEMPTED TO ROB A DRUG STORE.—Charles Budd, colored, was arrested last evening charged with attempting to rob a drug store, at Ninth and Lombard streets, by opening a window. It is stated that the prisoner has made other attempts of the kind in the neighborhood.
