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COURT INTELLIGENCE.

LEGAL INTELLIGENCE. A CORPORATION HAS NO LIEN ON THE STOCK OF A DEBTOR FOR A DEBT DUE BY HIM, UNLESS IT BE GIVEN BY STATUTORY AUTHORITY.

Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.—Chief Justice Woodcock presiding. The Commonwealth vs. Read and Arnew.—The S. Camship Dock Company vs. Maivida Heron, administratrix of Alexander Heron, for use of Alexander, trustee in error to the District Court of Philadelphia. Division of the Court by Thompson, J.

It is clear that there is no lien at common law on stock for debts in favor of the corporation issuing the stock. Ang & Ames on Corp., section 335, and authorities there referred to. It is obvious that a different rule would sweep the whole-course doctrine of the common law against secret liens. When such a lien exists, it is by statutory authority, either express or implied.

Whether a lien by law would be sufficient to create a lien of stock for the debts of the corporation, the company in case of trading, manufacturing, and other corporations, not engaged in loaning money, seems not only to be doubtful, but generally denied. Certainly, I think it would not be a lien of the kind by law brought home to a purchaser of the stock before the purchase.

But it is not indispensable in this case to decide these questions; for no lien is given by the act incorporating the defendants, nor did they pass any law authorizing the corporation to create a lien of stock for the debts of the corporation, the company in case of trading, manufacturing, and other corporations, not engaged in loaning money, seems not only to be doubtful, but generally denied.

CONGRESS. WASHINGTON, May 17. Senate. The bill to prohibit the carriage, shipping, or transportation of nitro-glycerine on passenger vessels or railroads was continued. The resolution to appoint Examiners to examine the site for a fresh water basin for the iron-ore lake at Portland, Maine, was passed.

The bill to grant lands to aid in the construction of a railroad from the Central Pacific Railroad in California to Portland, in the State of Oregon, was passed. The Diplomatic Appropriation bill was taken up at 3 o'clock.

House of Representatives. Mr. Dawes (Mass.) gave notice that he would call up to-morrow the contested election case of Follet against Nelson.

Mr. Mason (Iowa), from the Committee on Coins, Weights and Measures, reported bills to authorize the use of the metric system of weights and measures, directed to the Secretary of the Treasury to furnish to each State one set of standard weights and measures of the metric system; to authorize the use in Post Offices of weights of the determination of grams, and to authorize the President to appoint a special commissioner to facilitate the adoption of uniform coinage between the United States and foreign countries. All of which were passed.

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The case seemed to be pretty fully presented to the Court. The plaintiffs charge Weed and his associates with conspiracy to obstruct a grand jury from the construction of the telegraph line from Secretary Stanton for the mutual benefit of plaintiffs and defendants, and to restrain Thurlow Weed and others from disposing of certain lands in the State of Pennsylvania and New Orleans Telegraph Company was argued before Judge Jones, at special term of the Superior Court, yesterday.

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
