Passage of the Military District Bill. The House of Representatives yesterday, under the lead of Thaddeus Stevens, passed the bill for the more efficient government of the insurrectionary States by a vote of 55 to 109.

Mr. Stevens, in urging the passage of the bill, said it was not intended as a reconstruction bill, but simply as a police bill, to protect the loyal men of the South from anarchy and murder and rapine, until Congress took a little more time to establish civil governments there; and if gentlemen choose to introduce to-morrow a joint resolution making the Louisiana bill applicable to all the other Rebel States, it might pass both Houses in two hours.

Whereas, The pretended State Governments of the so-called Confederate States of Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Mississippi, Alabama, Louisiana, Florida, Texas, and Arkansas were set up without the authority of Congress and without the sanction of the people, and

Whereas, The so-called Governments afford no adequate protection for life or property, and encourage lawlessness and crime; and Whereas, It is necessary that peace and good order should be enforced in the late so-called Confederate States, until loyal and republican State Governments can be legally established, therefore

Section 4. And be it further enacted, That courts and judicial officers of the United States shall not issue writs of habeas corpus in behalf of persons in military custody, except in cases in which the person is held to answer for a crime committed within the jurisdiction of the Courts of the United States within said military district, and indicate therein.
