PETTY POLICE ITEMS.

—Last Saturday evening a man by the name of Henry Rodgers was arrested in Market street on charges of receiving stolen goods. He had a hearing before Alderman Hamdell, and was held in \$500 bail to answer.

Hugh Daly was arrested at Second and South streets last Saturday evening, on a charge of infringing the ordinance in regard to oratory to animals. It appears that he was abusing a poor looking specimen of horse flesh in such a manner that the bystanders interfered and had him arrested.

Charles Burrow, a lad of fifteen years of age, was arrested yesterday morning, at Fifth and Monroe streets, on a charge of attempting to commit a felony. It is asserted that he tried to conceal himself in a building in that locality, but was discovered while hanging over a balcony.

STEALING WASH CLOTHS.—This offense is getting as common as assaulting a policeman. Every day in Market street, on charges of stealing wash clothes are recorded. Patrick McLaughlin was arrested on Saturday evening, in the neighborhood of Florida and Filizwater streets, whilst endeavoring to appropriate to his own use a nicely-washed linen of a thrifty housekeeper in that neighborhood.

CORNER LOUNGING.—Perhaps there is no habit more destructive to the morals of youth than that of loitering in the streets, and, in fact, of lounging on the corners of streets. Although it is bad enough on week days, it becomes an almost unbearable nuisance upon Sunday. Every Monday morning the police reports team with accounts of arrests of those who persist in lounging on the street corners.

BEATING HIS WIFE.—Last evening, as Officer Counts was walking down Spruce street, he heard the cry of "murder." He immediately ran to the corner between Second and Third streets, and there observed a colored man, named James Barnes, beating his wife with a stick. The officer took Barnes into custody and conveyed him to the lock-up.

DEATH OF AN ESTIMABLE CITIZEN.—Isaac H. Porter, Esq., who for many years has been connected with the West End company, and was also Treasurer, died at his residence, on Cooper street, on Friday evening. NEW REVENUE CUTTERS.—J. W. Lynn, Esq., the enterprising ship-builder of this city, is constructing the superior batteries of Lieutenant Frank Barr, of the revenue service, two revenue cutters. We made a thorough inspection of the cutters, and are enabled to lay before our readers their exact length, breadth, etc., and how they will be fitted up.

They are 110 tons burden, 82 feet long at the draught; 20 feet beam, about 7 1/2 feet deep; and are carried on a single screw, with a water-tight hull. They are coppered and copper-fastened about nine feet from the keel, and above that covered with galvanized iron with a galvanized fastening. The hulls are coppered and coppered around the masts on deck are framed with mahogany. The hull of the boat is of white oak, and the deck is of white pine.

The length of the berth deck is about four and a half feet. The dimensions of the captain's cabin are 12 by 12, and the officers' ward room, 12 by 12. On the quarter deck, a skylight, which is sufficient light to both the cabin and wardroom. Below the berth there is another deck, and on it are stores of provisions, powder and shot, etc. Amidships on the berth deck, are two water tanks, of the capacity of a thousand gallons. The masts will be of white oak, and the rigging of the same material.

Each boat will be provided with two of Johnson's patent windlasses, and carry four anchors. They are fore and aft rigged, and are expected to be able to sail in any wind. The cutters now in the service. At the Yard, there are, in addition to the ones above described, two schooners being constructed. The cutters are nearly completed, and the keel of another has been laid. It is not definitely known when the revenue cutters will be launched, as the inclemency of the weather prevents the work from working continuously on them, but it is supposed they will be ready in about two weeks.

The men were arrested. This morning the freeman, Robert Jayner, was arrested as being an accessory. Upon the person of one of the men arrested, was first found a key of the door. How he became possessed of it is as yet a mere matter of conjecture. Two more are supposed to have been engaged in the robbery, and that they took the goods stolen with them is pretty certain. The trio will have a hearing before Alderman Butler today, when the facts of the case will be more fully elicited.
