

THE FASHIONS.

The First Official Concert and a Gorgeous Scene—Dress of the Princess Children—An Imperial Fete and Court Fashions Order—The Most Admired Dress Circles—Materials, Colors, Trimmings, and Make for Spring.

Paris, March 22.—The first of the official concerts of the season was given this day week by Comte Walwski at the Corps Legislatif, in honor of the young Prince's birthday.

The arrangement of the interior of the galerie des fetes was entirely novel, two rows of reserved seats being placed in the centre of the brilliantly illuminated hall.

The orchestra formed a vast amphitheatre in the midst of an artificial grove. About 10 o'clock Prince de Godeville entered on Comte Walwski's arm.

M. Paderewski led the orchestra. Mme Miolan Carvatho gave Aubert's air d'Action and Gounod's Valse de Mireille.

Monsieur, the 18th, a grand concert was given by the Emperor and Empress at the Tuileries. "En face" was printed at the bottom of the invitation cards.

At 9 the Emperor and Empress entered the Salle des Marechaux, and the concert began. Between each part they rose and congratulated the artists.

The lowest were the most admired toilets.—A white gown grain brocaded with fuchsias; the bustle of each flower ended in a red pearl.

Another was made of mauve-colored satin, covered with tulle, of which the puffs were divided with force-motifs.

The richest toilet was a pink satin; round the bottom of the train fell a fountain of Alcazon; the bodice was a peplum, ending with pearls.

The other great event of the week is the performance at the Gymnase of Alexandre Dumas, Jr.'s new piece, the piece of Madame Aubray.

The Emperor and Empress were present, and subsequently "tout Paris." The author himself was nowhere visible, though longanities searched out every dark corner.

The prettiest little bonnets were noticed in all the dress boxes. One looked very attractive, I thought, on a lady of rank and rank.

The preparation of these statistics is but one step towards a still further expansion of our admirable Public School system.

The Board of Control now have at hand a reliable basis on which to establish their work.

Knowing the precise number of children in each section of the city, and their classification by age, sex, and employment, it will be easy for them to ascertain whether the facilities offered by the schools under their general supervision are at all equal to the demand.

The mere fact that there are in the city at the present time over twenty thousand children between the ages of six and eighteen—full fourteen and a half per cent. of the entire number—who are neither in attendance upon any school nor engaged in any kind of regular employment, shows that there is an ample field for labor still left open.

A large number of these, as a matter of course, are to be set down in the list of invalids, or as absent from the city for the express purpose of receiving a liberal education; but we think both these classes will be found to embrace but a small minority of those included in the twenty thousand in question.

The Board of Control, however, have at their disposal an immense sum of money for the erection of new school-houses, and about half-a-dozen are already under way.

That the work will be pushed forward on these and many others already projected we have no doubt; more especially as the Board itself has recently undergone a radical reformation, the appointment of its members by a late act of the Legislature having been taken out of the hands of petty politicians, and lodged with the responsible and unpartisan judges of our city courts.
