

CITY INTELLIGENCE.

ALFRED PALMER SWEARING.—Before United States Commissioner Hubbard, on Saturday, John Roberts and Antoinette Noblitt had a hearing upon the charges of perjury, in swearing to the validity of an application for pension money. It appears that Mrs. Isabella Livingston told her son, John Kennard Livingston, at Andersonville prison, in August, 1864, she made application for bounty money, and found that another woman claimed the same. The papers were drawn by the name of John Roberts and Antoinette Noblitt attached, as was receiving the identity of the woman who was swearing to the pension money. They were arrested, and after a hearing, as stated above, were held for a further hearing, when it is supposed that Mrs. Livingston will be present.
