The Republican Party the Party of the Constitution.

The future historian who shall truthfully write the record of our times, will accord to the Republican party the honor of having been the champion of both liberty and law.

The American political system is founded upon the principle that all rightful governmental power resides in the people, and is to be wielded by them.

In carrying out this fundamental principle of popular rule in the actual framework of our political structure, we have divided the Government into three parts—the law-making, the law-executing, and the law-keeping.

By the act of February 2, 1854, consolidating the city of Philadelphia, it is provided that no member of Councils, during the term for which he shall be elected, shall "hold any office or employment herein created or provided for of a municipal character."

Now the object of such a provision is unmistakable. It is to prevent the creation of any new office by vote of Councils, in order that one of the members of their body should hold it.

But with the Executive the case is different. He is under the constant temptation to step outside of his proper sphere, and to attempt to give his own will the force of law.

Every suggestion of this kind is, so far as it goes, a violation of the will of the Executive for the people.

Now in all this there is an attack upon the fundamental principle of our entire political system, more open, deliberate, and persistent than anything heretofore attempted in this country.
