FROM WASHINGTON TO-DAY.

Tearing Down the Old Penitentiary. PROBABLE REMOVAL OF BOOTH'S REMAINS.

THE LETTERS FROM MR. CHASE AND MR. GREELEY.

Remains of Wilkes Booth. Part of the old Penitentiary building at the Arsenal is to be torn down, and in doing so the remains of John Wilkes Booth will be reached.

Letter from Chief Justice Chase. Johnson's friends say he has a letter from Chief Justice Chase, indorsing the removal of General Slicker, as a vindication of the authority of the Supreme Court, and its publication is looked for, though it is alleged to have been confidential.

Mr. Greeley's Letter about Steedman. The publication of Horace Greeley's letter to Johnson, recommending General Steedman for Secretary of War, in January, 1866, excites much commotion, and it is generally believed that Johnson himself, for no one supposes Greeley was silly enough to entrust a confidential letter to a person to deliver who would take a copy of it.

LEGAL INTELLIGENCE. COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.—Judge Patroon, after a summer sojourn in the East, has returned to the courts of this city, which he has discharged with uniform fidelity, and has received a commendation of the public in general. He received a most liberal salary, and conducted the business of the day.

MEETING OF THE BOARD OF SURVEYS.—This meeting of the Board of Surveys was held this morning, President Knoess in the chair. The Board reported a number of culverts, on being referred to a number of reports, a resolution authorizing the construction of the following:—One on Tasker street, between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, one on Third street, between Columbia and Madison streets, one on Madison street, between Fifth and Sixth streets, one on Montgomery Avenue, and one on Montgomery Avenue, and one on Twenty-second to Twenty-third.

A CASE IN ADMIRALTY.—This morning the crew of the ship Antioch, late from San Francisco, California, had a suit before United States Commissioner Hilditch, in which they claimed articles of shipment they were to receive three months' advance pay in currency, before leaving the vessel. They had appeared in court with advance paid in gold, and it is claimed the difference in premium between gold and currency should be deducted from their subsequent pay. The sailors contended that the advance was given absolutely as the three months' advance. The Commissioner decided in favor of the crew, but the case will be taken to Court.
