Some Features of the Kansas Election.

The aggregate result of the election in Kansas upon the negro suffrage and female suffrage amendment is as follows:—For negro suffrage, 5595; against negro suffrage, 13,563; for female suffrage, 5043; against female suffrage, 13,493.
