THE INTERNATIONAL POSTAL SYSTEM.

FROM THE CAPITAL.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—The President officially announces in a proclamation that the Legislature of Georgia has ratified the fourteenth amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

Information has been received at the Post Office Department, warranting the belief that the British Post Office Department will assent to the proposed modifications of the new postal convention between the two countries, by which among other things, the postage on small pamphlets will be reduced.

The convention is an improvement in various particulars over the one now in force. Postal negotiations are now pending between the United States and France for a more liberal exchange of mails.
