WHAT ANSWER? By Anna E. Dickinson. Published by Ticknor & Fields. Miss Dickinson is one of the noted women of the day, and a novel from her pen will be read with much interest by a large number of people independently of its merits or demerits.

This work is the journal of a tour through Europe made by Miss Bremer in 1856 and 1857. FROM ST. LOUIS. ST. LOUIS, Sept. 24.—A letter from Fort Dodge, Kansas, dated September 19th, to the Leavenworth Conservative says: "The Indians here have been in pursuit of far south, and beyond the borders of Texas. He has had several fights, whipping them badly, killing and wounding seventy. The loss of the troops has been slight."

FROM CONNECTICUT. HARTFORD, Sept. 24.—L. D. Porter, of East Berlin, has been swindling merchants in this city, by means of forged checks, to the amount of \$16,000. Parties in Meriden and Middletown are also sufferers. Porter has left for parts unknown, with some \$30,000 gained by his forgeries.

FROM RHODE ISLAND. PROVIDENCE, R. I., Sept. 24.—Two sisters, Mrs. Healy and Mrs. Sullivan, were fatally hurt today at Waterford, on the Providence and Worcester road. They were attempting to get upon a moving train, and both fell under the wheels. One had both legs broken above the knees, and the other had a foot and ankle crushed, and neither can survive. Both are said to have been under the influence of rum.
