Acting With the Democratic Party. Even since the publication of the letter written by General Dix on September 4, in which he so mercilessly exposed the incapacity and treachery of Horatio Seymour, the Democratic papers have been thrown into a towering passion by the mere mention of his name.

We can believe this, because it would be in entire keeping with the character of the man. The man who did all in his power to save his country is not the one to risk its future happiness, should he attain the Presidency, by sowing the seeds of prejudice or persecution.

THE VITAL STATISTICS OF RUSSIA.—The Russian census for 1866 has just been published, and shows that the country contains, according to the most trustworthy estimates, about 8,078,054 English square miles, or nearly three times the extent of the United States.

Of this vast territory, much the larger portion, or nearly six million square miles, lies in Asia, where the empire is constantly extending its boundaries. The following list of the great empires of the world exhibits the comparative territorial importance of the em-

1. Russia, 8,078,054 square miles; 2. China, 4,677,347 square miles; 3. British Empire, 4,420,134 square miles; 4. United States, 3,466,749 square miles; 5. Brazil, 3,231,621 square miles; 6. Turkey, 1,913,460 square miles. The population of Russia is nearly 80,000,000. In this respect it is the third State—the Chinese empire, with 450,000,000, and the British, with 200,000,000, preceding it.

THE DEBT AND TAXES.—In his recent Spring Garden Hall speech, Judge Kelley said:—"What, Mr. Seymour, are the relations of this debt to the population of the country, to its realized wealth, and to its future resources? To enlighten us on these questions we must ascertain the amount of the debt and its character, and happily the papers of the day bring us the last monthly statement of the Secretary of the Treasury. By reference to it you will find that the total debt, less money in the Treasury, is \$2,535,614,313 09; of this sum \$25,630,125 00 bears no interest, \$412,984,911 37 being greenbacks, fractional currency, or gold certificates of deposits, and the balance matured debt not presented for payment, and much of which never will be presented, the bonds and other obligations representing it having been lost or destroyed. I also invite your attention to another item of \$33,314,000, upon which the Government is not called to pay interest."

THE MERCANTILE MARINE OF CANADA.—A return of the number of vessels owned in the Dominion of Canada, on July 1, 1867, just published, shows:—The city of Toronto is set down as owning and having registered in all 31 vessels, consisting of 1 paddle steamer, 4 screw steamers, 1 large, 1 brigantine, 23 schooners, and 1 sloop. The total tonnage is 3741, and the value \$127,300. The number of men employed is 219. The totals for the whole Province of Ontario are vessels, 451; tonnage, 68,959; value, \$2,787,800; number of men employed, 3192. The total of shipping owned and registered in the whole Dominion—Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island, and Piquet, in Nova Scotia, from whence no returns have been received, totals as follows:—Vessels, 6822; tonnage, 776,343; value, \$23,929,092; and the number of hands employed, 37,435.
