Forrest and Basil Duke Want Kilpatrick to Cut a Heroic Figure. The Memphis Avalanche of the 29th ultimo publishes the following letter from General Forrest to the editor of the Memphis Avalanche.

MEMPHIS, Oct. 25, 1868.—Mr. H. K. Shackelford, New Haven, Conn.—Sir:—The false and mendacious representation of me, made by General Judson Kilpatrick, of New Jersey, on the 20th inst., to which you call my attention, is not the first in which he has indulged since his appearance on the hustings in this country.

The charge is but the natural offspring of Kilpatrick's common and merited fame as an unprincipled and easy liar. It is easy enough for me to say, in order to please the public and sustained by every chivalric officer and soldier in the Federal army, that what he has said of me in the speech referred to is untrue.
