The Story of the First Half of the Year in Figures.

We present to-day interesting and important statistics for the first six months of the year 1869, compiled from the weekly and monthly reports, as they have been published in our columns from time to time.

THE CRIMINAL CALENDAR.

Present Status of the Police Force of the City. So many changes in the police force of the city have been made by Mayor Fox since his assumption of the duties of the office, that we give a general resume of the present status of the Philadelphia police.

Chief of Police—General St. Clair A. Mulholland; salary, \$3,000.

First District, embracing all of the city south of South street, between Broad street and the Schuylkill river and Sixth street—Lieutenant James Erickson, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Second District, south of South street, between the Delaware river and Sixth street—Lieutenant James Erickson, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Third District, embracing the Fifth Ward—Lieutenant Martin Killackey, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Fourth District, embracing the Sixth Ward—Lieutenant Martin Killackey, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Fifth District, embracing the Seventh and Eighth Wards—Lieutenant William P. Campbell, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Sixth District, embracing the Ninth and Tenth Wards—Lieutenant Christopher Gercke, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Seventh District, embracing the Eleventh and Twelfth Wards—Lieutenant Francis Bruen, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Eighth District, embracing the Thirteenth and Fourteenth Wards—Lieutenant John Kelly, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Ninth District, embracing the Fifteenth ward—Lieutenant William H. Souder, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Tenth District, embracing the Sixteenth and Seventeenth Wards—Lieutenant John Spear, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Eleventh District, embracing the Eighteenth, Nineteenth, and Twentieth wards—Lieutenant Richard H. Pritchard, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Twelfth District, embracing the Twenty-first ward—Lieutenant John Kelly, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Thirteenth District, embracing the Twenty-second ward—Lieutenant John Platt, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Fourteenth District, embracing the Twenty-third ward—Lieutenant James McLea, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Fifteenth District, embracing the Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth wards, West Philadelphia—Lieutenant William M. Leech, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Sixteenth District, embracing all of the city south of South street, between Sixth and Broad streets—Lieutenant James Smith, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Seventeenth District, embracing the Twenty-sixth and part of the Nineteenth wards—Lieutenant Andrew Dehaven, two sergeants, and 44 policemen.

Delaware Harbor Police—Lieutenant John G. Smith and 40 policemen.

Schuylkill Harbor Police—Lieutenant Simon Jacoby and 40 policemen.

There are also 13 policemen and 11 non-commissioned men at the Central Station, Fifth and Chestnut streets.

The salary of each of the 20 lieutenants is \$1,100; that of each of the 36 sergeants, \$1,000; and that of each of the 2,000 policemen, \$700.

THE LATE CHARGE OF ROBBERY AGAINST THE POLICEMEN OF THE FIFTH AND SIXTH WARDS.

At noon to-day, the investigation into the charge made against certain policemen of robbing the store of Leonard, Baker & Co., during the fire on Wednesday night, was continued by Mayor Fox.

The Mayor stated that his attention had been called to the various reports with reference to the conduct of some of the police at the store on Wednesday night last. He desired a full investigation, and had taken this occasion to call together everybody who knew anything of the circumstances with reference to the alleged robbery by the policemen.

THE DEBT STATEMENT.

A Decrease of \$16,000,000. The Public Debt Statement.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—The public debt has decreased over \$16,000,000 during the month. The following is a recapitulation of the statement just issued:

A TRIFLE CALM.—Charles McIlwain was up on a final hearing this afternoon before Alderman Kerr, at the Central Station, to answer the charge of robbing the store of G. S. Williams, No. 1219 Arch street, of a large amount of valuable goods, which were identified by Mr. Williams.

The arrest was made by Officer Monahan, No. 274, of the Sixth district, and the Mayor, who was present, publicly complimented him for the energy and bravery he had manifested in the discharge of his official duties in the matter. He had a physical contest with the defendant of over ten minutes duration, and, though laboring under severe disadvantages, he completed him and brought him safely to the station-house. Arrived there, the defendant took a survey of him, and remarked, somewhat scornfully, that if he "had known the officer was so small sized a man, he would not have let him take him."

The Mayor spoke of the action in the highest terms, saying he considered it worthy of public commendation.
