

NEWS SUMMARY.

The German Press Association of this State will meet in this city to-morrow, at the hall of the German Society, South Seventh street.

Revenue Detective James Brooks has seized fifty-four barrels of whisky which had not been properly marked. A claim for the whisky has been put in by John W. Byrnes, one of the William Marcus Patton, an alleged lunatic.

Work has ceased upon the Masonic Temple for the year, the walls now being under cover to protect them from the winter. Thus far the work accomplished has come within the estimate made by the building committee, and a handsome margin is left for the resumption of the work in the spring.

The following subjects were also adopted: Monday, Personal Religion; Tuesday, the Nation; Wednesday, Family Religion; Thursday, Christian Unity; Friday, Municipal and Church Officers.

At a meeting of the teachers of the State of Indiana, held at Indianapolis yesterday, the question of colored schools was discussed and the necessity for mixed schools fully demonstrated.

The proposed reduction of the tariff on pig iron, to three dollars per ton, was discussed at a meeting of iron manufacturers in Cincinnati, yesterday.

Governor McDougall's family arrived at St. Paul yesterday, on their way to Canada. They deny that he had anything to do with arming or inciting the Indians to rise.

A man named Steve Bennett was murdered at Bell's Station, on the Memphis and Louisville Railroad, on Thursday night, by one Tom Judson, who was taken from the police, on Monday night, and lynched.

The Dalmatian insurrection is entirely suppressed.

As yet the question of Papal infallibility has not been submitted to the Ecumenical Council.

The French Ministry resigned yesterday, and M. Ollivier has been requested by the Emperor to form a Cabinet.

Flo Noni says that the members of the Ecumenical Council have no voice in the regulation of that body.

Yesterday the new session of the French Corps Legislatif commenced, and Schneider was re-elected President.

Reviewing the Alabama claims yesterday, the London Times comes to the conclusion that England need not fear the resumption of the negotiations.
