

NEWS SUMMARY.

William Williams, the lad who was run over on the Washington Avenue Railroad on Tuesday, died at the Pennsylvania Hospital yesterday.
Cold and stormy as last night was, a babe only a few hours old was left on a door step on Fifth street, below Spruce. It was taken to the Union Street Station.
George Richardson, thirty years old, residing at Tenth and Montgomery avenue, fell yesterday from the front platform of a car on which he was driving, and the wheel passing over his hand, crushed it in a dreadful manner.
Daniel Nawa, twenty-nine years old, residing at No. 1809 Rhoades street, had one of his hands caught in a cog-wheel yesterday, at Baldwin's locomotive works, and badly lacerated. Both hands were admitted into the Pennsylvania Hospital.
The law requires that whenever the removal of the remains of deceased persons is desired from one cemetery to another, a permit for that purpose shall first be secured from the Board of Health. Accordingly, 1387 permits of this nature were issued by the board last year, realizing to the city \$678-50.
A meeting of the sub-committee from Finance, Board of Revision, Law and Retrenchment and Reform met last evening to consider by what means the outstanding taxes may be most promptly collected. Various plans were suggested and freely discussed, and a committee of three was finally appointed to prepare a bill giving the directors power to enforce the payment of outstanding taxes.
A post-mortem examination made by Dr. Shapleigh of the body of the unknown man who died on Sunday morning, in a cell of the Third District Station-house, establishes the fact that the deceased had been suffering from the effects of congestion of the lungs. No traces of liquor were discovered during the examination, which proves conclusively that the man was not drunk when he picked up in the street.
A meeting of the Philadelphia Produce Association was held last evening, on Delaware avenue, yesterday afternoon, President Dwyer in the chair. The Secretary reported that since last meeting two arrests had been made for selling goods without a license. Several propositions for membership were submitted, and were referred. The proposed amendment to the Constitution, increasing the annual assessment of the dues of members, was considered, and finally was laid over until the next meeting.

Domestic Affairs.
Gold closed yesterday at 120 1/2.
Nevada last year produced \$13,815,000 of treasure.
Three more volumes of the Roll of Honor have been published.
Snow to the depth of thirty inches has fallen at Huntington, in this State.
The Postmaster General made a number of changes in post offices in this State yesterday.
The House, yesterday, refused to adjourn for the purpose of attending McMullin's Richmond picnic.
A bill was introduced in the Senate yesterday to increase the number of judges of the Supreme and Circuit Courts.
A further discussion took place in the Senate yesterday, on the House Census bill, which was finally laid on the table.
The Senate bill, extending the jurisdiction of aldermen to \$300 suits, was reported negatively in the House at Harrisburg yesterday.
After a lengthy discussion, the proposition to form an independent temperance party was defeated in the State Convention at Harrisburg yesterday, by a large majority.
It is proposed that the colored people shall celebrate the ratification of the fifteenth amendment by assembling for prayer and thanksgiving on the official announcement being made.
Yesterday the House Committee commenced an investigation of the alleged sales of cadetships. One witness testified that a member of the last House sold a naval appointment for \$800.
A bill enabling parties losing money by gambling or lotteries to recover the amount with interest, by proceedings within six years, was favorably reported in the House, at Harrisburg, yesterday.
Governor Jewell and the other State officers, save the Lieutenant-Governor, for which position Morris Tyler is put forward, were renominated by the Connecticut Republican State Convention yesterday.
Governor Walker, in a message to the Virginia Legislature yesterday, referred to the difficulty of finding judges not disqualified by the fourteenth amendment, and recommended a petition to Congress for a general removal of disabilities.
Very little progress is being made with the investigation into the management of the State Treasury. Yesterday the committee met, and Mr. Mackey not being ready with certain papers previously ordered, after some wrangling adjourned until Tuesday.
Mr. Davis presented in the House yesterday a bill to prevent the erection of public buildings on Independence Square, and Mr. Hong another, providing for the appointment of a Commissioner to see to the erection of the necessary court and municipal buildings on Penn Square; also, for an assessment to defray their cost. The Philadelphia delegation propose that the people shall fix the site by a vote next October.
Foreign Affairs.
A bill is promised by the English Government enabling aliens to acquire and hold lands.

THE PARIS RIOTS.
THE CITY.—The city is now tranquil. A strong police force is patrolling the streets. Many of the workshops were closed to-day.
DISTURBANCES AT MARSEILLES.
A crowd of several hundred persons gathered in Marseilles last night and, besides, and in other ways insulted the police and gendarmes. They were summoned to disperse but refused to do so. The police then charged upon them and made a large number of arrests. After an examination of the prisoners this morning, only thirty were remanded to prison.
ARREST OF "MARSEILLAISE" EDITORS.—STOP-PRESS.
PARIS, Feb. 9, via London.—All the editors of the "Marseillaise" have been arrested. The printer of the paper, M. Valcu, refuses to put it to press.
FURTHER OUTBREAKS IN PARIS.
PARIS, Feb. 9.—Non.—The morning journals have the following details of the disturbances which occurred last night. There had been much excitement among the people during the day, which culminated about midnight in a new outbreak.
BARRICADES NEAR THE PALAIS ROYAL.
These were not confined to one locality, nor were they on the scene of those suppressed yesterday at La Villette and Belleville, but nearer the centre of the city and only a few squares from the Palais Royal, new and stronger barricades were thrown up and tenaciously defended. THE POLICE REFUSED—SOLDIERS CARRY THE BARRICADES.
The police attacked several of them, but were quickly driven off. The military force was then

brought into requisition, which, as on the day previous, carried all the barricades without firing on the crowd.
UNWILLINGNESS TO USE FIREARMS.
There seems to be hesitation on the part of both the troops and rioters to resort to the use of firearms.
ORDERS TO THE POLICE.
Strong detachments of police have been placed on all the Boulevards, with orders to forcibly disperse all crowds.
ARRESTS.
Hundreds of rioters have been arrested.
KILLED AND WOUNDED.
Several were wounded, mainly in conflicts with the police, and it is reported that some were killed.
THE "MARSEILLAISE".
did not appear to-day, and all its editors are under arrest for aiding the rioters. One of the editors, M. Raspail, was also arrested for the same offense.
THE MINISTERS
remained at the police headquarters all night.
KIT BURNS.
His Rat Pit Dedicated as a Home for Fallen Women.
The haunt at 273 Water st., N. Y., known as "Kit Burns' Rat Pit," which has been hired by Rev. William H. Boole of Mrs. Burns, who owns the property, for a mission and a home for the reform of abandoned women, was on Tuesday dedicated to that purpose with religious services and appropriate addresses. The large room on the first floor, which was formerly a bar-room and is now to be devoted to daily prayer meetings and other religious gatherings, was crowded with people, many of them ladies, who desired to exhibit their interest and sympathy in the benevolent enterprise. A great many of the denizens of that region gathered about the entrance, and Kit and his companions, who still occupy the adjoining premises, freely expressed their disgust for the whole proceedings.
The exercises were opened with singing and prayer after which Bishop James of the Methodist Episcopal Church, made an address. He said that there was an interest attached to the occasion beyond its mere novelty. It was proposed to recover and reform these unfortunate beings, not only by ministering to their physical wants, but by moral suasion, but by the power and influence of religion. It was not a hopeful field of labor, but it was Christ's field, and the most solemn obligation rested upon His followers to devote themselves to its work. It was said that not one in a thousand of the women could be permanently reclaimed, but that made it none the less a duty to do all that can be done to rescue them from their degradation. Some of the degraded ones had given promise, in their early years, of great beauty of person and mind, which adorn the face of woman, but they had been robbed and cheated of the heritage by villains who, per chance, move in the best circles of society, and receive no condemnation for their foul deeds. A terrible day of reckoning awaited them, but in the meantime their poor victims, whose very sensitiveness and delicacy had prevented them from facing society and avoiding utter ruin, deserve our deepest pity and tenderest sympathy.
Rev. Stephen H. Tyng said that this was his second visit to this place. About ten years ago he had preached in the year, in the rear of the building, and had become convinced that the movement which was begun for the regeneration of Water street was no transitory excitement. He had no confidence, he said, in benevolence which springs from a sense of duty. To be effective it must spring from an intense love of Christ, and a consequent desire to benefit all who need our aid, regarded as His representatives. Personal influence is what was needed. Men could be saved only through men, and what these poor women wanted was the presence of sympathizing hearts and the aid and encouragement of Christian men and women.
Mr. Woodruff then arose and said that he knew of no way of at once carrying into effect the proposition which he had just proposed, except by giving \$5 to the cause, and asking unteemed other persons to give a like amount, to make up \$100 to assist Mr. Boole in beginning his good work. The sum was very soon made up, and one gentleman having given \$50, which was taken as a basis for a second \$100, which was soon completed, and then a general collection was taken up, resulting in an addition of about \$50 to the funds already given. Daily prayer meetings, from 12 to 1 P. M., are to be held at the Mission, and evening meetings will soon be inaugurated.
