

Miss Catharine Beecher on Female Suffrage.

At the session of the American Woman's Suffrage Association in New York city recently, Miss Catharine Beecher was present and offered a paper embodying her views in opposition to the woman's suffrage movement.

Her voice not being strong enough to be heard in the large hall, the paper was read by Mr. Blackwell. In the first place, Miss Beecher stated the things that she did not object to for women. She did not object to their speaking in public, nor to their preaching, nor to their earning their own independence in any lawful calling, nor was she opposed to their ruling as governesses in schools.

But her objection to the woman's suffrage movement was that it was a wrong method applied to a right object. The object is to relieve suffering—the method is to enforce by law that which ought to be won by love.

It was not known by any one present what the object of the visit was, or who the parties were. As they left the gallery the proprietor remarked that he had witnessed, in his time, some accurate shooting, but nothing that equalled this.

Burlingame's Skill with the Rifle.

Speaking of the Burlingame-Brooks affair, a correspondent of the Chicago Evening Journal relates the following:—After the challenge had been given by Brooks and accepted by Burlingame, and the point of meeting being fixed in Canada, both parties claimed a little time to arrange some matters before leaving Washington.

Brooks and his friends left Washington some twelve hours after, and on arriving in Philadelphia they were met by a gentleman, who, as it was subsequently ascertained, led Washington with the Burlingame party, and who was carefully watching all their movements.
