

WILHELMSHOE.

The Prison of the ex-Emperor. CASSEL, Sept. 11.—Wilhelmschoe, or "the German Versailles," as it has been often termed, has just now assumed a greater interest than it has since it was the summer palace of the Elector of Hesse-Cassel, Frederick the Second.

You may walk or drive three miles from Cassel through a straight avenue of limes to the palace of Wilhelmschoe, and beside it stands the theatre built by Jerome Bonaparte when King, and in which he himself used to play.

The Aquatic Staircase and the Octagon Temple of the Winds, with the statue and other extravagances connected with it, are reported to have employed 2000 men for fourteen years.

The Cascade of the Karlsburg is another of the many wonders of the place—a flight of stone steps 300 feet long, over which a stream of water is at times permitted to fall.

The artist intended a jet of water 50 feet high should spout from his mouth, but one plays there now. The staircase of this "Chateau d'Eau" is surmounted by an octagon building 1312 feet above the Fulda, surmounted by a pyramid serving as a pedestal to the colossal Hercules, 31 feet high, of beaten copper.

The grounds were in splendid order. Some women were cutting the lawn and clearing out among the shrubbery the day that we were there. The prettiest face I have yet seen in Germany peeped out from among the rose-bushes.

—Berlin has 28 theatres; but, at present only nine of them are open. —The Turcos give as a reason for throwing their coffee into the faces of the high-born young ladies who dine with them in the hospitals, that it isn't strong enough.

—A great many boys between the ages of 12 and 16 are missing in the different cities of Germany. In Berlin alone forty have thus mysteriously disappeared. They have run away to join the army, and probably most of them are now at the front.

—The English Government is making 30,000 ammunition boxes for India. These boxes are lined with tin, an improvement on those formerly used; they have rope handles and sliding lids. They are made of mahogany and teak. Their size is twenty by seven inches, and they are constructed to hold 1000 rounds of ball cartridge each for the Enfield-Snider breech-loading rifle.

—The Turcos in the hospital of St. Hedwig, at Berlin, are said to be the worst of the whole crew, and it is they who have given a bad name to all the rest, and who insult the Sisters of Mercy who are ministering to them. Sometimes it is necessary to have a file of soldiers when the Turcos get on the rampage; but the sight of the dreaded needle-guns quickly restores order among them.

—Recently at Cassel, a French captain of Zouaves died of his wounds, and was buried with military honors. A company of the 3d Prussian Infantry Regiment fired a salute over his grave, and the whole corps of officers, together with many citizens, followed the coffin, and immediately behind it, between the captain of the company and the commander of the forces, walked a wounded officer of Zouaves.

—At Munich the first captive who died was a Turco, Ben Conder Mahomed. A Bavarian company of infantry, with drums and a number of citizens headed by a Catholic priest, followed the coffin, on which were placed the soldier's turban and a Bavarian salute. The soldiers fired their pieces over the grave, and the officer and the priest each threw a handful of earth into it, and the first Turco rested in German soil.
