

NEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs. —William M. Bunn was yesterday bound over for embezzlement on the charge made by Charles Hartnack. The charge was the same as the other.

—The Plasterers Union contains 150 members, who receive on an average \$3 per day. —At a meeting of the Public Buildings Commissioners yesterday, a majority report in favor of the intersection location was presented and adopted; also a minority report, which was referred to a committee. The latter was in favor of the location on the Harrison estate. A resolution directing plans of buildings for the four squares was defeated.

Domestic Affairs. —The Hudson River is now open, and navigation has been resumed. —The heaviest rains occurring in Southern California for many years have recently fallen. —On Monday a young lady of Sacramento died through the carelessness of a druggist in dispensing the wrong medicine. —The Spanish Minister gave a grand dinner at Washington last evening, which was attended by a number of prominent persons.

—A Duluth, Minn., despatch says that the end of the Northern Pacific Railroad was yesterday within a mile of the Mississippi river, and extended one hundred and thirteen miles beyond that city. —Mayor Sturgis, of Meridian, Miss., was yesterday morning, on his own motion, given a safe conduct to the cars by citizens, on a pledge to go North and never return, after tendering his resignation.

—An attempt was made on Monday night to throw the Ashland train off the track at Mahanoy Plain, Pa., by placing a cross-tie on the track. Fortunately it was discovered in time to prevent an accident.

—Later particulars from Meridian, Miss., relative to the shooting of Justice Bramlette, set forth that six colored men were subsequently shot and killed as the result of the action of one of their number in summarily despatching the justice.

—Mr. Lopez Roberts, Spanish Minister to the United States, was officially received by the President yesterday, and the occasion was marked with unusual interest. In presenting his credentials from the King of Spain, Mr. Roberts expressed the most kindly feeling for this country.

Foreign Affairs. —The ship "Mistress of the Sea" has foundered at sea. —The National Assembly is awaiting the report of the committee on removal from Bordeaux to Paris.

—The return of the French soldiers interned in Switzerland has been postponed in consequence of railroad interruptions. —A thousand workmen have struck at Newcastle, England, because the masters refused to pay them weekly instead of fortnightly.

—General Pallades has assumed command of the National Guard of Paris, and, in his first order, issued yesterday, he invokes cooperation in the work of maintaining order, declaring that tranquillity alone will restore the prosperity of France.

Bismarck is preparing a circular addressed to the diplomatic agents of Germany in foreign countries, reviewing the history of the war and the changed political position of the German Empire. He comments with great severity upon the attitude of England during the war.
