FROM BALTIMORE.

International Typographical Union. BALTIMORE, June 7.—The International Typographical Union met at 9 A. M. A number of reports were made from committees and resolutions presented, among which the following were adopted:— Resolution admitting pressmen to membership in unions. Also, resolution that the jurisdiction of all subordinate unions extend half way to the next union. Also, leaving to subordinate unions the regulation of apprenticeship. A motion to take from the table the resolution offered on Monday last, to allow colored printers the rights of membership in unions, was laid on the table—yeas, 44; nays, 17. A resolution was adopted recommending arbitration instead of strikes for the settlement of all points, and arranging the manner in which it shall be effected. Richmond, Va., was chosen as the place for holding the annual meeting. The convention then went into secret session.

FROM NEW YORK.

Volunteers Drilling at Niagara. NIAGARA, N. Y., June 7.—A camp of volunteers has been formed here for the annual fourteen days' drill. Between four and five thousand troops are on the ground. Strict military discipline will be maintained. The bands of the regiments and the American forts played "Yankee Doodle," which was responded to by loud cheering, from the United States troops. Proposals for Bonds. NEW YORK, June 7.—There were twelve proposals for bonds to-day, amounting to \$1,944,000, from 11:40 to 11:50. The awards will be \$1,000,000 at 11:45 and \$1,194,000 at 11:50. The Broadway Widening. Wm. Wood was appointed on the commission for the widening of Broadway, vice Wm. E. Dodge, declined. Removing Obstructions in New York Harbor. NEW YORK, June 7.—The work of removing the dangerous rocks in mid-channel between Governors' Island and the Battery is finished. Work will at once be resumed in blasting other troublesome obstructions known as Countess Reef, East River.

FROM NEW ENGLAND.

New Hampshire Politics. CONCORD, N. H., June 7.—At 11:15 the Governor and Council appeared in the Hall of Representatives and administered the oath to the members elected. The roll called showed all but two members present. The whole number of votes for Speaker was 337. Wm. H. Gove, Democrat and Labor Reform, received 164. James O. Adams, of Manchester, Republican, 163. Gove, the successful candidate, is an old Abolitionist, and was nominated by the Democrats to secure the Labor Reform vote for Governor. The Republican candidate for President of the Senate is George W. Kendrick, of Manchester.

FROM THE DOMINION.

Opposition to the Washington Treaty. HALIFAX, June 7.—The New Brunswick Government has appointed three of its members, Messrs. King, Moore, and Frazer, a delegation to confer with the Governor of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward's Island, with a view to united action against the Washington treaty. Superintendents' Meeting. TORONTO, Ont., June 7.—The twenty-fifth annual meeting of the American Association of Superintendents of Lunatic Asylums is now in session here. There is a large attendance of members from all parts of the United States. Dr. Compton moved that the next meeting be held in New Orleans the second Tuesday in April, 1872. The motion was referred.

FROM NEW JERSEY.

Asa Packer Elected President of the West Jersey Railroad Company. NEWARK, June 7.—Hon. Asa Packer, of Pennsylvania, was present to-day at the meeting of the stockholders of the West Jersey Railroad, and signed an agreement to take charge of the road and complete it within eighteen months, and settle its indebtedness. He was then chosen President of the Board of Directors, with Robert H. Sayre, of the Lehigh Valley Railroad, as Vice-President, and others of the same road as directors.

FROM THE WEST.

Lunatic Asylum Superintendent Elected. CINCINNATI, June 7.—Dr. Joseph T. Webb was yesterday elected Superintendent of Long View Lunatic Asylum.

NEWS SUMMARY.

City Affairs. —Alderman Heins has committed Henry Selman to await the result of injuries inflicted on Jacob Siegrist at Belgrade and Thompson streets, on Sunday night last. It is charged that an attack was made on Mr. Siegrist by a number of men, and that Selman struck him with a club, fracturing his skull. The wounded man's life is in danger. —Dr. Shapleigh, the Coroner's physician, yesterday investigated the case of the sudden death of the child in St. Mary street, in which it was suspected that the colored doctor administered poison. It was found that the child died of dropsy of the heart, produced by debility from insufficient nutrition. Consequently the colored doctor was discharged. The medicine given by him was perfectly harmless. Foreign Affairs. —It is said that Jules Ferry will be Minister to Washington. —Plead has been appointed Governor of the Bank of France. —The session of the German Parliament will probably close on the 15th instant. —All the pieces of the Column Vendome are found, and the monument will be exactly restored. —The damage done to Paris by the fighting and fires of the Communists is set down at 800,000,000 francs. —Twenty-five women were killed and fifty injured by a railway accident near Paris, on Tuesday. —Juan George Kohl, a distinguished German navigator, died on Tuesday at Bremen, in the 64th year of his age. —The obsequies of the late Archbishop Darboy took place yesterday in Paris, at the Cathedral of Notre Dame, with great pomp. —The Italian Minister of Foreign Affairs guarantees to deliver into the hands of the French authorities all escaping insurgents who reach Italian soil. —La Verite says a compromise has been effected by which the law expelling the Orleans princes from France will be repealed, and their election to the Assembly be declared valid. —The New Brunswick Government has appointed three of its members to confer with the Governments of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward's Island, with a view to united action against the Washington treaty. —The fusion of the Monarchists in France is reported to have wholly failed, owing to the intrigues of Thiers, who, it is said, privately excites the uncertainty of maintaining a non-descript republic with himself as the chief. —A Wisconsin postmaster has written to Washington for "some eternal revenue stamps," saying he has "several coils for them."

At a special meeting of the Committee of Select and Common Councils on Steam Engine and Boiler Inspection, the Inspector was instructed to call the attention of Boiler Owners and Users to Section 4 of the Act of Assembly, approved May 11, 1864, which provides that "if any person shall, on or after the first Monday of July next, maintain or keep in use or operation any stationary steam engine or boiler without the said City of Philadelphia, who shall not have received a certificate that the same has been found to be safe and competent, as is hereinbefore provided, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction in the Court of Quarter Sessions for said county shall be sentenced to pay a fine not exceeding five thousand (\$5000) dollars and to undergo imprisonment in the jail of said county, either with or without labor, as the Court may direct, for a term not exceeding two (2) years."
