

Port Wardens and the Charge of One Dollar and Fifty Cents for Furnishing them "Statistics."

Having set myself right, in your paper of yesterday, as to the mistake of "one hundred and fifty dollars" instead of one dollar and fifty cents, made by the reporters for the morning papers, it now becomes my duty to redeem my promise to vindicate the action of the Board of Trade, and your comments thereon of Tuesday afternoon, by showing that that action and those strictures were just and well founded.

By vessels reporting, the board will be enabled to give daily a full and reliable report of the arrivals and departures at our port, and obtain for the use of the public the complete statistics of the commerce of Philadelphia. This has long been felt a desideratum, and numerous commercial gentlemen have requested the board to take such action as would place Philadelphia in the same position as New York, Boston, and Baltimore.

It is to be regretted that the Board of Port Wardens should pay to instead of charging against the skipper this \$1.50 for his information and valuable "statistics." But do the Port Wardens intend to give daily a full and reliable report of the arrivals and departures (at our port) of all the market and oyster-boats, as they come and go, for the use of the public? I venture to say for the public that they will willingly dispense with this valuable information, in the interest of the poor skipper and for the sake of cheap onions, tomatoes, and potages.

But the writer says that it is "to place Philadelphia in the same position as New York," etc. If he means by this that at the port of New York there is a such service, he is right. The service of the schooner trade of the sound and the North river, it is simply untrue; if he means to count up our arrivals and departures of the market shallops against the steamers of the Cunard and Inman lines, and the net of 2000 to 3000 ton vessels entering there, and so to publish them to the world, he will be guilty of a petty and infamous fraud, which the high-minded merchants of Philadelphia will not only discountenance, but punish by sweeping this law from the statute-book.

Further, this is a most unequal and unjust exaction. The Messrs. Cope enter and clear the Tonawanda perhaps three times a year, for which, as they are near the Port Wardens' office, four dollars and fifty cents is to them but a trifle. Repeated personal complaints have been made at this office by merchant men—men who, that the fee itself, repeated on trips averaging three in two weeks, became oppressive, and the addition of travelling to the office and there dancing attendance until the proper official should put in a personal appearance to receive it was nothing short of tyranny and oppression under color of law.

Have I not said enough to vindicate the action of the board and your comments upon it, as upon a par with stealing money from a dead pauper's eyes? If not, there is much more to be added.
