OUR NAVIGATION.—The steamer *Sarah Gordon*, Captain O. Hinckley, has opened the navigation, this year by passing through Bayou Plaquemine on Friday of last week. Since this boat has arrived at our landing, several others have also entered our Bayou, and returned back to New-Orleans, heavily loaded with sugar, cotton and other produce. Judging from the present appearance, it appears we will have five boats constantly running in our trade, the present season, the *Sarah Gordon*, the *Red River*, the *Alice W. Glass*, the *Sydonia* and the faithful *Opelousas*, the first will be commanded by Capt. Hinckley, the second by Capt. Gustave Louallier, the third by Capt. Johnston, the fourth by Capt. Davis, and the last by Capt. Neal.

Thus, the people of our Parish will hardly complain of the boats or the captains who command them.

Monday next, 13th instant, is the day fixed by law, for the opening of the winter session of our District Court, Judge Dupre, presiding.

IMPROVEMENT OF OUR NAVIGATION.

Mr. B. A. Martel, one of our State Senators has introduced a bill into the Senate, providing for the removal of all obstructions to the navigation of the Atchafalaya River, including the mouth of the Bayou Courtaulieu and for one mile up the same; and also for the construction of a levee from the west bank of the mouth of said Bayou, ending on the Atchafalaya, and to extend so far up the Courtaulieu as may be deemed necessary.

To carry into effect this much desired amelioration, says the *Daily Advocate* of Baton Rouge, the bill provides for an appropriation of fifteen thousand dollars out of the Internal Improvement Fund, and the appointment of five Commissioners to act conjointly with the State Engineer.

The object contemplated by the bill is well admitted, is one of vital interest and importance to the State, and especially to that wealthy and fertile portion of it lying west of the Mississippi, and South of Red River. It is a well known fact—one which has long since become a crying evil—that the impracticability of navigation in the Atchafalaya, and the Courtaulieu, is such, at certain seasons of the year; as to totally preclude from the inhabitants of the Atchafalaya and Opelousas regions the facilities of transportation. The Atchafalaya is obstructed in places by tall dirty wide and live foot deep, in lowest water. This evil is the more seriously felt, when the Bayou Plaquemine, is too low for navigable purposes, thus blocking up all outlet to the Mississippi, and leaving no alternative to our inhabitants, but that of storing away their crops to await the precarious contingency of a rise in the waters.

A safe, easy, and rapid transit to market would obviate all this delay, inconvenience, and injury, and transit, with the innumerable streams running in every direction through our State, it seems to us we have a right to demand and ought to have been permanently located years ago. Nature has done much to favor the object, and only needs the mind of science to investigate and devise, and the skillful hand to execute properly the work of completion. If the bill of Mr. Martel be adopted, as we hope it will, the State should make it a point to see that the work be done in a business as once beneficial and lasting, for it is a work, as we said before of vital interest and importance, and should not be hurried over in a superficial, unsystematic, and unscientific manner, as other works of the kind in our State have sometimes been, at a ruinous cost to the State, and with but little advantage to any one.
